4-H & FFA General Rules

These departments are conducted in cooperation with the Jones County Agricultural Extension Council.

MEMBERS—Only those enrolled in 4-H Club work and/or the Agricultural Education Departments in Jones County (including those living in Jones County and enrolled in Anamosa, Cascade, Midland, and Monticello FFA) who have completed their work under the supervision of the County 4-H Youth Committee and Ag Ed Instructors may participate in any of the events and exhibits. 4-H membership is open to all youth that are in grades 4th-12th. Membership may continue until the completion of the year of their high school graduation. Membership year is September 1 through August 31. An exhibitor must be a member who has carried their project during the entire period according to project entry rules. FFA members are eligible to exhibit at county fair one additional year after high school.

AGE GROUPS FOR ALL PROJECTS ARE:

JUNIOR: Grades 4, 5, 6 • INTERMEDIATE: Grades 7, 8

SENIOR: Grades 9, 10, 11, 12

Exhibitors must choose to exhibit under 4-H or FFA for each project area (examples of project areas: beef, pet, swine, photography, home improvement, etc.) and are limited to number of entries after each class number and name.

ENROLLMENT—Enrollment must be made through 4hOnline or with FFA Advisors, deadline for re-enrolling members is December 31, and for new members is May 15.

ELIGIBILITY—All fair entries (including FFA Members) must be submitted through FairEntry at fairentry.com by July 1st. All paper identification forms (examples: Off Farm Housing, Pet, Bucket/Bottle, Clothing, Communication, and Working Exhibit Reports) must be filed with the Extension office by the designated dates. A grace period for postal delivery will be acceptable. Failure to comply with this rule will result in a member being denied the opportunity to exhibit at the fair. Anyone not complying with all the regulations of their project or who otherwise have not completed their work will not be permitted to compete. An individual project CANNOT be weighed in, identified, or exhibited as a 4-H/FFA project in more than one county or one official 4-H/FFA County Fair. This does not apply to open class or open multi-county junior shows/competition. No member will be denied the opportunity to exhibit their project due to the fault of a leader or advisor.

REPORTS—Anyone not complying with all of the regulations of their project or who otherwise have not completed their work will not be permitted to compete.

SUPERVISION—Supervision of 4-H and FFA project work will be under the jurisdiction of the County 4-H Youth Committee and the Ag Ed/FFA instructors with the cooperation of the County Youth Coordinator. Any questions or decisions about exhibits, regulations or reports will be made by this group.

EXHIBITS—Superintendents will be in charge of locating and housing all exhibits and will locate them best suited to their conditions.

RECORD BOOKS—Completed 4-H and/or Ag Ed/FFA record books are to be turned in to the respective 4-H leaders or Ag Ed instructors. 4-H record books must be submitted to respective 4-H club leaders for project award and All Around Youth Exhibitor award evaluation prior to the specified submission deadline.

EXHIBITOR DRESS CODE: 4-H and FFA Exhibitors are to wear the official Jones County Fair green exhibitor t-shirt or any plain white shirt or blouse. NO last names will be allowed to be on shirt during shows. No personal advertising on clothing such as company or farm names will be permitted. Wear clean clothing. All exhibitors MUST wear pants that are at least ankle-length or appropriate-length skirts and closed-toe shoes. Exhibitors WILL NOT be allowed to wear hats or caps (excluding those in the Horse and Pony Department) while exhibiting at the county fair. (See specific Dress Code instructions as provided in individual divisions.) Failure to abide by the "EXHIBITOR DRESS CODE" will result in forfeiture of exhibitor's premium for that project.

4-H & FFA Premiums

The Fair Association provides financial support for project premiums in 4-H & FFA Livestock; STATIC; and Other 4-H Opportunities Departments; as well as ribbons and judging expenses. Prize money will be based on the unit system unless otherwise stated for specific classes. Placings in various classes have been assigned unit values. The cash value of the units will be assigned according to the money available. Premium checks will be distributed through the Extension Office and club leaders. All entries will be awarded premiums based on purple, blue, red, and white ribbons.

All-Around Youth Exhibitor

As a part of the Great Jones County Fair, special recognition will be given to the top 4-H/ FFA youth exhibitors. The winners will be selected based on a weighted system that will take into consideration all projects exhibited in the 4-H/FFA Livestock, STATIC; and Other 4-H Opportunities Departments. Record books must be submitted by the designated due date.

4-H Blue Ribbon Fund

The Jones County 4-H Blue Ribbon Fund was initiated in 2006 with the idea of generating a new alternative to swine ribbon auction by funding a simple premium bonus for the 4-H/ FFA swine champions and have also previously awarded bonuses to dairy exhibitors. The Blue Ribbon Fund also supported exhibitor scholarships and other 4-H youth development activities as determined by the committee.

Iowa Youth Code of Ethics

Youth are expected to be sincere, honest, and act in sportsmanlike ways at all times. Youth represent the entire program and their behavior reflects on their parents, leaders, club, and the entire youth program. All adults involved with the youth program, leaders as well as parents, are expected to set positive examples and serve as positive role models by what they say and do. Any youth who breaks the code of ethics or allows another person (adult or peer) to talk them into violating the code of ethics agrees to forfeit all prizes, awards, and premiums. The youth may also be prohibited from participating in and exhibiting at this and future activities and exhibitions including the Iowa State Fair and other county, state, or regional exhibitions, as well as other disciplinary action.

In addition to the "Iowa Youth Code of Ethics", Jones County 4-H and the Great Jones County Fair also have rules and regulations which they impose on the county level including those designated in the Livestock Project Requirements (L-2), Iowa 4-H publication (4-H 202), and county fair book. Supervisors of 4-H and FFA members and exhibitors at the county level in regard to the Code of Ethics as well as the rules and regulations mentioned above and below will be under the jurisdiction of the County 4-H Youth Committee (including FFA Advisors, County Extension Education Director, County Youth Coordinator and 4-H Program Assistant) as delegated by the County Fair Board of Directors.

Youth agree to follow these guidelines:

1. I will do my own work, appropriate for my age and physical and mental development. This includes research and writing of exhibit explanations, preparing exhibits (such as sewing, cooking, refinishing, etc.), care and grooming of animals, etc. Adult assistance should help guide and support me, not do it for me.
2. All exhibits will be a true representation of my work. Any attempt to take credit for other's work, alter the conformation of animals, or alter their performance is prohibited. Copyright violation or allowing others to complete your exhibit is considered misrepresentation and is prohibited.
3. I will treat all people and animals with respect. I will provide appropriate care for animals.
4. I will present exhibits that are safe for consumption. All food exhibits will be safe to exhibit and for judges to evaluate. Other exhibits will be safe for judges to evaluate and for exhibition.
5. All food animals that may be harvested immediately following the show shall be safe for consumers and shall have met all withdrawal times for all medications and be free of violative drug residue.

6. If any animal requires medical treatment while at the fair or exhibition, only the Official Fair Veterinarian may administer the treatment. All medications that are administered shall be done according to the label instructions of the medication used.
7. My animal's appearance or performance shall not be altered by any means, including medications, external applications, and surgical procedures. Any animal that is found to have changed its appearance or its performance shall be disqualified from the show and have penalties assessed against the exhibitor, parent, and/or guardian by the management of the fair or exhibition.
8. I will follow all ownership and possession rules and, if requested, will provide the necessary documentation.
9. I will follow all livestock health requirements for this fair or exhibition, according to the state health requirements as printed in the Premium Book of the fair or exhibition. I will provide animal health certificates from a licensed veterinarian upon request from the management of the fair or exhibition.
10. By my entering an animal in this fair or exhibition, I am giving consent to the management of the fair or exhibition to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. If the laboratory report on the analysis of any sample indicates a presence of forbidden drugs, this shall be evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory, and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the exhibitor, parent and/or guardian to prove otherwise.
11. I am responsible for my exhibit, and I will not allow others to violate this Code on my behalf. By my entering an exhibit in this fair or exhibition I will accept any disciplinary action taken by the management of this fair or exhibition for any violation of this Code of Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or exhibition without recourse against the fair or exhibition.
12. I want my exhibit to be an example of how to accept what life has to offer, both good and not so good, and how to live with and learn from the outcome.
13. I will not be involved in any illegal activities while participating in 4-H and FFA events, including but not limited to alcohol, tobacco, or drug use.
14. Jones County 4-H will abide by any disciplinary action sanctioned against me by other counties or levels of the organizations and apply that action as appropriate to my participation in Jones County.

I agree to conduct myself in an honest, ethical, and upstanding manner, and I understand that **disciplinary actions** will result if these rules are violated. I understand that I am expected to represent the program in a positive manner. I have read, understand, and agree to follow this code of ethics, and any other rules of competition of the fair or exhibition as printed in its premium book.

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Livestock & Animal Department

GENERAL RULES:

Exhibits and awards will be made in accordance with the regulations under which these projects are conducted as stated in the 4-H 202 Animal Identification, Weighing, and Exhibiting Requirements for County, State, and Interstate Shows Publication (<https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/194>), Jones County Livestock Project Requirements (L-2) and this fair book.

1. Only members of Jones County 4-H Clubs or FFA chapters whose livestock projects were properly enrolled/entered/identified are eligible to show. FFA Chapters include Anamosa, Cascade, Midland, and Monticello.
2. Supervision of 4-H and FFA project work is under the jurisdiction of the Jones County Extension Council, County 4-H Youth Committee, and the Ag Ed/FFA Instructors with the cooperation of the County Youth Coordinator. Any questions or decisions about exhibits, regulations, or reports will be handled by this group; Extension Council has the right to make the final decision.
3. All 4-H/FFA members exhibiting beef cattle, bucket/bottle calves, dairy cattle, goats (dairy/meat), poultry, rabbits, sheep, or swine (all food animals) MUST complete YQCA (Youth for the Quality Care of Animals) certification for their respective age group (www.yqca.org) by July 1.
4. Members MUST have properly enrolled in the project AND have submitted proper animal identification to the Extension Office through 4hOnline2.0 (FFA members use FairEntry) by May 15.
5. Poultry and Rabbits born after May 15 have a special identification deadline of July 1st.
6. All fair entries must be properly submitted through the FairEntry system by July 1 (fairent.com). No late ID, late fair entries, or additions to fair entries will be accepted or allowed to be exhibited, therefore, late fees will not be assessed.
7. Official report forms may be secured from 4-H club leaders, Ag Ed Instructors, or the Jones County Extension Website.
8. Identification numbers (registration, ear tag, tattoo, etc.), as well as birthdates, MUST be provided if requested on forms (calthood vaccination identification tags will qualify if they are individually numbered, but a calthood vaccination tattoo DOES NOT qualify). Proper identification of ear tags, tattoos, ear notches, etc. MUST be in place before arriving at the fair. (No fresh tattoos or ear notches are allowed).
9. Any animal that has been properly identified in 4hOnline 2.0 (4-H) or in FairEntry (FFA) and meets all eligibility requirements will be eligible for the exhibition provided the proper entry form was submitted.
10. Ineligible/extra animals may not be brought to the fair.
11. A predetermined fee will be charged for all ear tags/wing bands used on animals at the starting weigh-ins (beef, meat goats, poultry, sheep, and swine).
12. For Jones County Fair eligibility, livestock projects must be cared for by the 4-H/FFA member enrolled in the project. If a project is at a place other than the member's family operation, it must be reported using the "Animals Housed Off Home Farm Request" form by May 15. Approval is up to the jurisdiction of the group identified in rule #2 above.
13. Animal(s) may be owned in partnership and conducted as projects by more than one member of the same family. However, only one member will be allowed to identify the shared animal in 4hOnline 2.0 (4-H) or in FairEntry (FFA).
14. A livestock project/unit/animal can only be exhibited in one individual class (excluding championship or showmanship) unless otherwise stated. Exceptions would be bucket/bottle, dairy heifers, dogs, horses, rabbits, poultry, and sheep.
15. An individual project cannot be exhibited as a 4-H/FFA project in more than one official 4-H/FFA county fair. However, a project may be exhibited in open junior shows in more than one county.

16. Each 4-H or FFA member must exhibit their own livestock project unless they have more than one animal in the same class or their absence is excused by the 4-H Youth Committee. A second animal in the same class must be exhibited by a Jones County 4-H or FFA member wearing a matching exhibitor number printed in red. To be an excused absence, a Substitute Show Person Request Form must be submitted to the Extension Office by July 1st. The substitute show person must be a Jones County 4-H/FFA member wearing the original show persons exhibitor number in red. If the form is not submitted or final approval is not granted, the animals will NOT be allowed to be exhibited. Exemptions will be made for injury, illness, or special circumstances. As identified by the 4-H youth committee "Inability to handle your animal" is not a suitable reason for a substitute show person. In such a case, the animal will not be allowed to be exhibited at all.
17. All Livestock must be stalled or penned in areas assigned. Animals are not to return to the trailers until released. See the Herdsmanship section for all other rules and recommendations for stalling, penning, and equipment usage.
18. Only such signs, placed cards, decorations, ribbons, etc. as provided by the fair shall be used. Special club signs may be used as approved by the 4-H Youth Committee.
19. Exhibitors will be allowed to receive, and book, orders for animals, but no deliveries will be made until the close of the fair. The notice must be given in writing to the Extension Office and livestock area superintendents prior to animals leaving fairgrounds. Any animal that leaves fairgrounds without prior approval will forfeit premiums for this animal.
20. Members must have exhibited their livestock/animal projects at the fair to qualify for eligibility in the Market Animal Auction.
21. Any animal removed from the fairgrounds before scheduled release time will lose premium money unless they have written consent from the 4-H Youth Committee.
22. There will be no early releases unless prior approval from the Extension Office. Early Release Request Forms must be submitted by July 1st. If prior approval was not received premiums will be forfeited. Depending on whether there could be weather exceptions; exhibitors will be notified of these at a given time.
23. Any artificial means of removing or remedying physical defects of conformation in animals exhibited will be considered as fraud and deception. No unnatural means of providing an animal feed, water, or other fluid (i.e. stomach pump, IV) will be allowed. All animals giving evidence of such treatment will be disqualified from the show (see Code of Ethics).
24. If an exhibitor and/or animal that has been disqualified, the exhibitor will no longer be able to show in the current year in that species. They will forfeit any awards and/or premiums in that species for the current year.
25. First and second place winners in each individual class are eligible to compete for Championships and Reserve Championships, provided they received a purple or blue award ribbon.
26. No persons other than the clerk, ring, and show officials will be allowed in the show ring during the time of judging.
27. For additional information on Iowa 4-H requirements see publication 4-H 202 Animal Identification, Weighing, and Exhibiting Requirements for County, State, and Interstate Shows (<https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/194>, Revised November 2024).
28. All protests against the "eligibility of an exhibit or the award by the judge" must be in writing and filed with the superintendent of the division from which the complaint arises within one hour after the occasion from such complaint occurred. Such protest must be stated plainly the cause of the complaint and be accompanied by a \$50 cash deposit. Such complaints will receive due consideration by show officials and judges. The cash deposit will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained.
29. No appeal of, or appeal from, an award based upon a statement that the judge overlooked an animal or article will be considered by the officials.



2026 HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITION OF LIVESTOCK, POULTRY AND BIRDS AT A COUNTY 4H/FFA FAIR EXHIBITION

ANY EVIDENCE OF WARTS, RINGWORM, FOOT ROT, PINK EYE, DRAINING ABSCESSSES OR ANY OTHER CONTAGIOUS OR INFECTIOUS CONDITION WILL ELIMINATE THE ANIMAL FROM THE SHOW.

No individual Certificate of Veterinary Inspection will be required on Iowa origin animals or poultry exhibited at County 4-H/FFA Fair, but the animals must be inspected when unloaded or shortly thereafter by an accredited veterinarian. Swine are required to be inspected either before being unloaded or before leaving a designated isolation and inspection area (prior to mixing with any other pigs). All animals moving from out of state into an Iowa county 4H/FFA Fair must meet Iowa Animal and Livestock Importation requirements. Each show must have an official veterinarian.

Quarantined animals or animals from quarantined herds cannot be exhibited.

Official identification listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection required for all cattle and bison of any age **coming in from out of state** used for rodeos, recreational events, shows and exhibitions.

SWINE

All swine must originate from a herd or area not under quarantine and must be individually identified. All swine are required to have individual official identification. All 4-H and FFA tags bearing the US shield **US** are official identification tags.

Swine originating outside of Iowa. All exhibitors must present a test record and Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that indicate that each swine has had a negative test for pseudorabies within 30 days prior to the show (individual show regulations may have more restrictive time restrictions), regardless of the status of the herd, and show individual official identification on test report. Electronic identification will not be considered official identification for exhibition purposes.

Swine exhibition requirements. “Swine exhibition” means an exhibit, demonstration, show, or competition involving an event on the state fairgrounds, a county fair, or other exhibition event. The sponsor of the exhibition must retain an Iowa licensed veterinarian to supervise the health of the swine at the exhibition location. The sponsor must electronically file the approved registration form and obtain approval from the state veterinarian at least 30 days before the event. The registration form includes the name of the exhibition and the address and telephone number of its location; the name, address and telephone number of the veterinarian; and the date of the planned exhibition. Sales of swine will not be allowed unless the event has been registered and received approval from the state veterinarian 30 days prior to the event.

Swine exhibition report required. The sponsor of the swine exhibition shall electronically submit to the department the approved report form within five business days after the conclusion of the exhibition. The form includes the name of the exhibition and the address and telephone number of its location; the name, address and telephone number of the veterinarian; the date that the exhibition occurred; the name, address and telephone number of the owner of the swine; and the address and telephone number of the premises from which the swine was moved after the exhibition if such premises is a different premises.

SHEEP AND GOATS

All sexually intact sheep must have an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag (Ex. IA1234-5678) or another official Scrapie tag. All sexually intact goats must be identified with an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag (Ex. IA1234-5678), another official Scrapie tag, or by an official tattoo registered with USDA (to register, call 1-866-USDA-TAG; 1-866-873-2824). Wethers less than 18 months of age are required to have an individual identification and a Scrapie tag may be used, but a Scrapie tag is not required.

POULTRY AND BIRDS

All poultry exhibited must come from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid clean or equivalent flocks, or have had a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within 90 days of public exhibition and the test must have been performed by an authorized tester. (SEE GENERAL SECTION 1.B) **Please note: Poultry purchased from a hatchery and raised for exhibition are not exempt from Pullorum-Typhoid testing requirements.**

However, "Market Classes" of poultry consigned to a slaughter establishment are exempt from the Salmonella testing requirements. "Market Classes" of poultry must be separated from all other poultry by a distance of ten or more feet and/or an eight-foot-high solid partition.

DOGS AND CATS

All dogs and cats exhibited must have a current rabies vaccination certificate.

FARM DEER

Accredited veterinarians must be approved to administer tuberculosis tests on Cervidae.

“Cervidae” means all animals belonging to the cervidae family, and “CWD susceptible cervidae” means whitetail deer, blacktail deer, mule deer, red deer, elk and moose. Native Iowa Cervidae may be exhibited without other testing requirements when accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that lists individual official identification.

All Cervidae must have been part of the herd of origin for at least one year or were natural additions, or must have originated from a chronic wasting disease monitored or certified herd in which these animals have been kept for at least one year or were natural additions. Cervidae originating from a herd with a diagnosis, signs, epidemiological evidence, or area under quarantine for chronic wasting disease may not be exhibited. The following statement must appear on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection:

“All Cervidae on this certificate have been part of the herd of origin for at least one year or were natural additions to this herd. There has been no diagnosis, signs, or epidemiological evidence of chronic wasting disease in this herd for the past year.”

THE DECISION OF THE OFFICIAL SHOW VETERINARIAN WILL BE FINAL.

When is the auction?

Saturday of the Great Jones County Fair @ 9 AM
Livestock Pavilion

How many animals are eligible per exhibitor?

All market beef
One market swine
One market sheep
One market goat
One meat rabbit division entry
One market poultry division entry

How do you participate?

4-H and FFA exhibitors can identify their participation in the auction on the July 1 paperwork. Exhibitors will have until the species check-out time to communicate any changes with ISU Extension and Outreach staff during the fair week. Identifying auction animals will secure a housing spot for the time between the livestock show and the auction. This means the animal would need to stay at the fairgrounds, under your supervision and care, until the animal is sold on Saturday. Once an animal is off the grounds, it may not come back. The animals not entering the auction will be released at the species checkout time (listed in the fair book).

How do you prepare for the auction?

Talk to potential buyers! The auction is only a success if buyers are there to bid for your project. Visit businesses, family, friends, or neighbors and ask them for their support at this year's auction! Share the buyer brochure with your potential buyer/s to help the buyer understand the options.

Why would you participate?

- Auctions are a real-life marketing tool that many producers use to market their livestock.
- Accurate record book entry for the value of the project at completion.
- Allow the buyer to stock up their freezer.

What are the exhibitor's expectations?

- All animals will be sold to the highest bidder.
- Auction animals cannot go on to other shows after entering the auction, such as the Iowa State Fair, Best of Best Shows, etc.
- It is the seller's responsibility to secure buyers.

What is the sale attire?

4-H and FFA exhibitors are required to wear show attire (4-H/FFA shirt, clean-cut jeans, and closed-toed shoes). Animals need to be presented in the ring, clean, and attractive to the buyer.

What is the livestock transportation process?

Buyers will select the location of the purchased animal. They will select from the following locations: back to the barn, a local locker, cascade sale barn, or packing plant.

What is the species order during the auction?

The sale order will be Market Beef, Swine, Sheep, Goat, Rabbit, and Poultry.

Do exhibitors write a thank you to the buyers?

ABSOLUTELY!! All exhibitors are encouraged to thank the buyers in person at the sale auction AND mail a written thank you note to the buyer after the auction.

#101 Beef Division

Breeding Beef Rules

1. See 4-H and FFA General Rules, Livestock and Animal Department General Rules.
2. Heifers must be born between September 1, 2024, and December 31, 2025, of the previous year.
3. Registration papers must be scanned into Fair Entry when identifying for July 1st. Registration papers must be presented when checked in at the fair as well.
4. All Breeding Beef (heifers and cows) MUST have a tattoo and one of the following methods of identification in 4hOnline/FairEntry.
 - a. Calfhood vaccination tag
 - b. Registration Number (required for purebred if showing in purebred class)
 - c. Official 4-H Tag (Electronic ID Tag (EID) – must be an 840 USDA shield tag)
5. All breeding beef MUST be dehorned.
6. A heifer cannot be identified as both a breeding heifer and market heifer. The same breeding heifer cannot be identified as both a Registered Heifer and a Commercial Heifer.
7. Heifers will be placed on breed type conformation, fitting and future usefulness. Registered classes will follow ISF 4-H beef breed list (steers/heifers) for class divisions with official breed qualifications verified by the Beef Committee.
8. Besides Supreme Champion and Reserve Supreme Champion Breeding Heifer, three honorable mention awards will be presented during the championship drive.
9. It is the intent that the FFA/4-H'er take responsibility for caring for and grooming his/her own animals. If assistance is needed it must be done by a family member and/or another current Iowa FFA/4-H'er and/or Jones County 4-H Leader/FFA Advisor. Family members include and are limited to parent/legal guardian, brother, sister, stepsiblings, aunts, uncles, or grandparents.
10. Painting, dyeing and use of color agents on beef animals is NOT allowed. Beef projects which show evidence upon arrival at fair and/or prior to entering the show ring will NOT be permitted to show. If a color or coloring agent rubs off an animal rubbed with either a towel or hand, that animal will be disqualified. Exhibitors can use colored grooming aids on hooves only. Animals are subject to toweling anytime.
11. To exhibit an animal in a particular breed/registered class, the entry must conform to the identification and registration rules established by the respective Iowa Breed Association and set forth in the Breed Classification and Identification requirements for the Iowa Junior Beef Breeds Association. IJBBA website - <http://www.ijbba.com/breed-rules>.

Section A – Breeding Beef Cow-Calf

Class A. Registered Cow-Calf

1. Any beef cow is eligible if it was identified previously as a heifer project or exhibited previously at the county fair in a registered or commercial heifer class by the same exhibitor. Exhibitors who received a Cattleman's heifer are eligible to exhibit as a cow calf. Animal identification must be verified by its ear tattoo and one other ID, listed in Rule 4 above.
2. The calf is to be born during the current calendar year of the fair. The calf MUST be ear-tagged or tattooed.
3. Classes will be based upon the breed of the cow (instead of the calf). There must be at least one cow-calf pair to have an individual breed class. Registration papers must be scanned into Fair Entry when identifying for July 1st. Registration papers must be presented when checked in at the Fair as well.
4. If necessary, classes will be divided by the age of the cow (1st) and calf (2nd).
5. The cow and calf must both be broke to lead.

Class C-K. Registered Heifer

1. Entries are open to heifers which are registered with their respective breed association. IJBBA website - <http://www.ijbba.com/breed-rules>.
2. Registration papers must be scanned into Fair Entry when identifying for July 1st. Registration papers must be presented when checked in at the Fair as well.
3. There must be at least 1 head to have an individual breed heifer class.

Class L. Purchased Commercial Heifers

1. There will be no breed divisions. Class divisions will be made by weight at the discretion of the committee.

Class M. County Bred & Raised Commercial Heifers

1. There will be no breed divisions. Class divisions will be made by the weight at the discretion of the committee.
2. Heifers must have been born and raised in Jones County or by a Jones County 4-H family (even if in an adjacent county). Home raised heifers would qualify for this class.
3. Verification from the producer/origin MUST be on file at the extension office by July 1st.

Market Beef Rules

1. See 4-H and FFA General Rules and Livestock and Animal Department General Rules.
2. Market Beef identification forms will be completed and submitted at the weigh in site. All Market Beef will have the same rules on weigh-in, rate-of-gain, identification, and fair Classes. Special identification requirements MUST be met at the weigh-in in December for market beef animals to be eligible for entry in the 4-H division at the Iowa State Fair and other regional shows.
3. Each member can weigh-in up to 10 Market Beef in December (consisting of any combination of Market steers, Market heifers, Dairy steers, 2nd Year Bucket/Bottle, and Market Stock).
 - a. A member cannot weigh-in more than 4 steers for the Performance Beef class. No bulls permitted.
4. Each member can exhibit up to 6 Market Beef at the fair (consisting of any combination of the animals from the December weigh-in: Market Steers, 2nd Year Bucket/Bottle Market Beef, Market Heifers or Dairy Steers). In addition, a member can identify 4 calves but exhibit up to 3 calves in the performance Beef class. All exhibitors must have identified their 3 performance beef calves by June 1st.
5. All market beef MUST be dehorned.
6. If a Market Beef loses its ear tag, the member must contact the Extension Office immediately to have a committee member/representative put in a replacement.
7. At beef weigh-in, the market steer is identified for its appropriate class (for example, Registered, County Bred & Raised, Purchased, Market Stock) on the Market Beef project identification report form. Exhibitor must identify and enter weights into 4-H Online/FairEntry by February 1st. The exhibitor has until May 15th to notify the Extension office of any class changes. The exception to this rule would be for registered steers without proper verification information will be moved to the Purchased class and the possibility of transferring 1 steer to the Performance Beef class.
8. It is the intent that the FFA/4-H'er take responsibility for caring for and grooming his/her own animals. If assistance is needed it must be done by a family member and/or another current Iowa FFA/4-H'er and/or Jones County 4-H Leader/FFA Advisor. Family members include and are limited to parent/legal guardian, brother, sister, step siblings, aunts, uncles, or grandparents.

9. Painting, dyeing and use of color agents on beef animals is NOT allowed. Beef projects which show evidence upon arrival at fair and/or prior to entering the show ring will NOT be permitted to show. If a color or coloring agent rubs off an animal rubbed with either a towel or hand, that animal will be disqualified. Exhibitors can use colored grooming aids on hooves only. Animals are subject to toweling anytime.
10. Registered classes will follow ISF 4-H beef breed list (steers/heifers) for class divisions with official breed qualifications verified by the Beef Committee.

Class N. Special Feeder Class

1. Market Beef that did not gain 2.0 lbs. per day will be exhibited in this class only. Mini breeds will be exempt from the 2.0 lbs. per day rate of gain requirement

Class O. Dairy Steers

1. Dairy steers must show appropriate dairy characteristics and cannot be exhibited in other beef or dairy divisions.
2. Dairy steers MUST be weighed in at the same time as market beef (December). Dairy steers will have the same starting weights, fair weights, rate-of-gain, ear tag and horn requirements as the other market beef.
3. Dairy steers may be sold in the county fair livestock auction.

Class P. 2nd Year Bucket/Bottle

1. These animals must be Market Beef (steers or heifers) that were properly identified as Bucket/Bottle calves during the previous year on the member's Bucket/Bottle Calf identification form (BC-1)/4hOnline.
2. These animals will be divided into beef and dairy classes. Dairy calves may be re-evaluated for appropriate dairy characteristics as mature market steers or heifers.
3. These animals MUST be weighed in at the December weigh-in.
4. These animals will have the same starting weights, fair weights, and rate-of-gain requirements as other Market Beef.
5. Original Bucket/Bottle Calf ear tags must remain in the animal until the December beef weigh-in. 2nd Year B/B Market Beef animals will be tagged with Official County Market Beef ear tags at the December weigh-in.
6. The number of 2nd Year B/B Market Beef that a member may weigh-in, and exhibit is limited by the number of B/B calves that the person properly identified the previous year. 2nd Year B/B Market Beef animals will count towards a member's Market Beef quota limit as listed above.
7. These animals cannot be identified or exhibited in any other livestock division/class.
8. 2nd Year B/B Market Beef may be sold in the county fair livestock auction.

Class Q. Market Heifers

1. Market heifers will have the same starting weights, fair weights and rate-of-gain requirements as steers.
2. A heifer cannot be identified as both a market heifer and breeding heifer.

Class R. County Bred & Raised Steers

1. Calves MUST have been born and raised in Jones County or by a Jones County 4-H family (even if in an adjacent county). Home raised steers would qualify for this class.
2. Verification of the producer/origin MUST be on file at the Extension Office by July 1st.

Class S-W. Registered Steers

1. Entries are open to steers which are registered with their respective breed associations. IJBBA website - <http://www.ijbba.com/breed-rules>
2. There must be at least 1 head to have an individual breed Registered steer class.
3. Registration papers must be scanned into Fair Entry when identifying for July 1st. Registration papers must be presented when checked in at the Fair as well.

Class X. Purchased Steers

1. All other steers that are not exhibited in the previous classes will be established as purchased steers.

Class Y. Market Stock

1. Max hair length of 1/2 inch over the entire body except for tail switch. Clipping for entries in this class must be done prior to fair. No clipping will be allowed once these entries enter the fairgrounds.
2. Steers and Heifers to be exhibited together.
3. Market Stock Steers not meeting Market Stock class requirements at fair weigh-in will be moved to Purchased Steers.
4. Market Stock Heifers not meeting Market Stock class requirements at fair weigh-in will be moved to the Market Heifer class.

Class Z. Rate-of-Gain

Jones County Cattlemen's Association will present Special Awards to the 10 exhibitors with the entries that have the best rate-of-gain in the above classes.



Section D – Performance Beef

1. Live Evaluation

1. A member can identify 4 calves but exhibit up to 3 calves in the Performance Beef class. All exhibitors must have identified their 3 performance beef calves in FairEntry by June 1st.
2. Animals must be beef steers (no dairy steers).
3. Performance Beef will have the same starting weigh-in date as other Market Beef.
4. It is recommended that steers will have a minimum starting weight of 650 lbs. and a maximum starting weight of 800 lbs.
5. Steers will be judged individually and without a halter.
6. Steers will be delivered/exhibited at a designated date and site (approximately 3 weeks before the fair). They will be shipped to the packer for carcass evaluation upon the conclusion of the live evaluation process.
7. Final placing and premiums will be based on carcass value added per day on feed.

2. Carcass Evaluation

Market Beef Starting Weigh-In (December)

1. It is recommended that all calves be haltered except Performance Beef.
2. It is recommended that all miscellaneous ear tags be removed.
3. No Vet work will be done at weigh-in sites.
4. It is recommended that Market Beef maximum beginning weight is 850 lbs. except for Performance Beef will be 800 lbs. If your animal does not meet the 2.0 rate of gain per day you will automatically be placed into the "special feeder class" at fair.
5. Completed Market Beef Identification report forms must be turned in at the December weigh-in.
6. Calves that are to be considered eligible to be shown at the Iowa State Fair must also complete other specified requirements at weigh-in such as retinal imaging, etc.
7. Market beef identification forms will be completed and submitted at the weigh-in site. All Market Beef will have the same rules on weigh-in, rate of gain (except mini breeds), identification, and Fair classes. Special identification requirements MUST be met at the weigh-in in December for market beef animals to be eligible for entry in the 4-H division at the Iowa State Fair and other regional shows.

Market Beef Fair Time (July)

1. The minimum Market Beef weight at fair time will be 850 lbs. to be eligible to show and receive premiums. Entries not making the weight requirements will be shown in a special feeder class and may remain on the fairgrounds and be sold in the auction. Mini breeds will be exempt from the rate of gain requirement.
2. NO beef cattle will be re-weighed for their official show weight without approval by the committee.
3. Market Beef entries will be divided into divisions by weight. Weight breaks for each division and individual class will be determined by the superintendents following the weigh-in at the fair.
4. The County Bred & Raised Steers and Purchased Steers will be subdivided into multiple divisions at the fair based on the number of steers in those respective classes. That will determine their representation in the championship drive.
5. Any Market Beef not making 2.0 lbs. per day will be shown in a special feeder class. They have to gain 2.0 lbs. per day to be eligible to receive a blue ribbon, with the exception of mini breeds. Rate-of-gain begins on the day of starting weigh-in (December) and concludes with the day of entry weigh-in at the fair. Rate-of-gain calculations for special feeder class will be carried out one (1) decimal place.
6. Rate-of-gain calculations for Rate-of-Gain contest will be carried out three (3) decimal places.
7. Registered steers must present the original registration papers at fair check-in time (no copies). Steers without necessary registration papers will be shown in a Purchased class.
8. Calves will be placed on individual merit from the carcass standpoint, taking into consideration conformation, quality, finish and gain. Goals should be "market ready" at fair time.
9. Besides Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Market Beef, three honorable mention awards will be presented during the championship drive.

#102 Bucket/Bottle Calf Division

1. See 4-H and FFA General Rules, Livestock and Animal Department General Rules.
2. Member can enroll newborn or orphan calves. Calves must have been born between January 1 and April 30. Calves MUST be in the member's possession within 2 weeks of birth.
3. Calves can be heifers or steers (no bull calves permitted, **MUST** be castrated/banded and healed); beef or dairy; purebred or crossbred. Dairy Bucket/Bottle Calves must show appropriate dairy characteristics.
4. If calves are crossbred with dairy, the calf will be shown in the dairy division.
5. Calves MUST be bucket or bottle-fed (no nursing permitted after 2 weeks of age).
6. Each member may identify and enroll up to 3 animals. Each member will be allowed to exhibit up to 2 animals at the fair but cannot have more than one entry per class. Members should not bring ineligible/extra calves to the fair.
 - a. Member **MUST** complete at least written records or oral interview to qualify for exhibiting at the fair.
 - b. Substitute show persons are **NOT** allowed.
7. Calves MUST have an EID ear tag and will be checked at the fair (tags can be picked up from the Extension Office). Duplication of ear tag numbers or tattoos of animals within individual family units is not allowed.
8. All calves MUST be dehorned. Animals without proper identification or with horns will not be permitted to show.
9. Beef Bucket/Bottle calves **CANNOT** be shown in any other project division. However, Bucket/Bottle calves which are dairy heifers may also be shown in the regular dairy show if they meet the age requirements. To do this, an enrollment and fair entry **MUST** be made in both Divisions, and the entry will count towards a member's quota in the Dairy Division.
10. Calves will be shown on a halter and fitted/shown according to beef or dairy guidelines. Show sticks will be allowed **ONLY** in the Beef Classes.
11. The classes will be divided according to the age of the exhibitor and Beef/Dairy. There **WILL** NOT be an overall champion.
12. Written records will be evaluated and scored prior to the county fair and must be delivered to the Extension Office on or before the deadline. Late records will result in reduced scores. No covers are permitted on reports. Oral interviews (without the calf) will occur prior to the fair. Live show ring evaluation will occur at the fair.
13. Judging and scoring will be based on:
 - a. accurate and complete records of the project (completed by the member)
 - b. what the member has learned about care and management of raising the calf.
 - c. general health condition and management of the calf and member's knowledge in this area
 - d. the fitting and showing of the calf (according to beef/dairy guidelines) with emphasis on what the member has learned (quality and conformation of the calf will not be a major factor - considered in the bucket/ bottle calf project)
14. Project will be evaluated on three parts (with tie score broken by Oral Interview score, then Written Record score):

Oral Interview.....	200
General health/fitting/showmanship.....	100
TOTAL POINTS POSSIBLE.....	400
15. Calves identified in this division have the option to be continued as a project during the following year(s) in their appropriate division: Market Beef, Breeding Beef Heifer, Dairy Heifer or Beef Cow-Calf.

#103 Dairy Division

1. See 4-H and FFA General Rules section on page 4, Livestock and Animal Department General Rules on page 7.
2. Individual animal identification MUST be able to be verified at the fair with TWO of THREE identifiers, which may include tattoo/ear tag number (tattoo, DHIA official ID acceptable), registration number (all levels of registry), or photos (one of animal's left side AND one of animal's right side).
3. All dairy cattle MUST be dehorned.
4. Each member may identify up to 20 head of dairy animals and exhibit up to 10 total dairy animals at the Fair (excluding dairy steers) with a maximum of 2 animals per any class.
5. Bucket/Bottle calves which are dairy heifers may also be shown in the regular dairy show if they meet the age requirements. To do this, an enrollment and fair entry MUST be made in both Divisions, and the entry will count towards a member's quota in the Dairy Division.
6. These classes will not be combined unless there is only one animal in a class. If there is only one animal in a class, classes may be combined/moved to the next oldest class, at the discretion of the Dairy committee. However, animals will remain within their original age level (i.e. calves with calves, yearlings with yearlings, etc. For example, if there is only one Senior Calf, it would remain in that class, etc.). (Members may not bring more than one beef and dairy calf.)

#104 Pets Division

1. See 4-H and FFA General Rules section. Livestock and Animal Department General Rules.
2. All class entries in this division need to be made in FairEntry by July 1st.
3. Cats must be owned and managed by the 4-H or FFA member since January 1 of the current calendar year. No kittens under six months of age can be exhibited.
4. All other pets must be owned or managed by the member by at least May 15.
5. Entries are limited to two (2) per class.
6. No reptiles are allowed to be exhibited at the county fair or state fair.
7. **Dogs can be shown as a pet or in the regular Dog Division.** The same animal can NOT be shown in both shows. Dogs may have participated in the dog obedience training but prefer to show in the pet show. They should identify their animal as a pet in 4hOnline and FairEntry.
8. **Rabbits can be shown as a pet or in the Rabbit division.** The same animal can NOT be shown in both shows. They should also identify their animals as a pet.

9. Be sure to read the general rules and health requirements.
10. All dog, cat and ferret exhibitors must have a valid copy of verification certificate for "Proof of Rabies Shots" (paper copy). Cats also need "Proof of Distemper Shots" (paper copy).
11. Each exhibitor MUST complete a Pet Exhibit Report Form (P-1) for each entry. The forms (paper copy) MUST be submitted to the Extension Office by July 1.
12. There MUST be at least 3 entries to have an individual species class. Otherwise, there will be an "All Other Pets" class for the species with less than 3 entries.
13. Pets will be conferenced judged on their condition and the member's ability to handle them. Development of personal skills in the areas including but not limited to decision making, communication, leadership and self-esteem, knowledge about the animal care; and skills and attitudes needed to be a responsible pet owner.
14. Pets must be leashed, controlled, caged, or contained on the fairgrounds.
15. Pets are to be on the fairgrounds ONLY during the time of judging.

#105 Dog Division

1. See 4-H and FFA General Rules section and Livestock and Animal Department General Rules.
2. A member may identify up to 4 dogs. A member may exhibit more than one dog, however, only one entry per member per class is permitted. To participate in the Handling/Showmanship class, the exhibitor and dog duo must also enter and show in Obedience OR Rally. They are not required to be in all three classification areas (Obedience, Agility, and Rally).
3. Dogs must be trained and shown by the 4-H or FFA members. If the exhibitor is showing at the fair, dog project members with less than 3 years of experience MUST HAVE participated in at least 3 open gym sessions with their dog during the current project year to be eligible to show. Dog Project members with more than 3 years of experience must attend 2 open gym sessions with their dog during the current project year to be eligible to show. To be eligible to show in the agility class each dog must attend an additional open gym session w/ agility to ensure the safety of the dogs and handlers while showing. The final decision for eligibility will be made by the dog committee and the trainer.
4. A family-owned dog may be managed by no more than two members of a family on a 50% basis. HOWEVER, ONLY ONE MEMBER WILL BE ALLOWED TO EXHIBIT THE SHARED ANIMAL IN EACH CLASS.
5. All dogs must be leashed or crated while waiting for their class to be called. Dog owners will provide their own water pan and food.
6. Prong collars are not allowed.
7. No harsh or excessive corrections are to be made on the grounds. Show superintendents, trainer, and judges have the right to dismiss overly aggressive dogs.
8. Any dog soiling the ring will be disqualified for the current class.
9. A copy of a valid verification certificate for a "Proof of Rabies" shot must be turned into the extension office prior to the first scheduled workshop (even if the member and dog won't be in attendance) and again at the county fair vet check/show check-in.
10. Any dog in heat or nursing may not be shown.
11. Ineligible/extra dogs/pets may not be brought to the fair.
12. 14 days prior to the show date, dogs are not allowed to be groomed by a professional groomer.
13. Identification of animals must be done in 4HOnline by May 15th. Entering animals in classes in FairEntry must be done by the FairEntry Deadline.

Section E - Agility Classes

1. Dogs shall be shown in this class on a buckle/flat collar and 6-foot leash. No chains, tags or attachments on chain or leash.
2. In order to exhibit in agility classes, you must have attended at least one agility practice.
3. All exhibitors are strongly encouraged to consult their veterinarian before beginning agility training to be sure that there are no problems such as hip dysplasia, disc problems, overweight, etc.
4. Copies of judges sheets will be provided shortly after a class wraps for members to retrieve.

Class N. 16" Class, On-Leash (For dogs greater than 18" at the shoulder)
Class O. 12" Class, On-Leash (For dogs greater than 14" and up to 18" at the shoulder)
Class P. 8" Class, On-Leash (For dogs greater than 10" and up to 14" at the shoulder)
Class Q. 4" Class, On-Leash (For dogs up to 10" at the shoulder)

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Standard Agility: Equipment will be A-frame, Teeter Totter, Cat Walk, 6 weave poles, 2 bar jumps, 1 tire jump, 1 tunnel, and Pause Table. A total of 8 obstacles and a course time of 75 seconds. Beyond 75 seconds, a time penalty will be assessed as described in the scoring section.

Obstacles:

A-Frame: Dogs must go up one side touching the contact zone on the up side with any part of one foot and down the other side in the direction designated by the judge. The dog must also touch the contact zone on the down side with any part of one foot prior to exiting the obstacle.

Teeter Totter: Dogs must go up one side touching the contact zone on the up side with any part of one foot and down the other side in the direction designated by the judge. The dog must also touch the contact zone on the down side with any part of one foot prior to exiting the obstacle. The handler must guide the teeter totter to the down position without dropping/slamming the platform.

Cat Walk: Dogs must go up one side touching the contact zone on the up side with any part of one foot and down the other side in the direction designated by the judge. The dog must also touch the contact zone on the down side with any part of one foot prior to exiting the obstacle.

Weave Poles (6): The dogs must enter the weave poles by passing between poles #1 and #2 from the right to left. They must continue this sequence until they pass the last two poles. Missing one or more will be a 10 point penalty. The dog's left shoulder must enter on the right of the 1st pole.

Pause Table: The dogs must pause on the table for 5 seconds in either a sit or a down position, as specified by the judge at the beginning of the competition. The judge will do an oral count and will also give a signal to "Go". If the dog breaks from the sit or down position the judge will stop counting and will only continue the counting when the dog returns to the proper position. When the judge say, "Go", the handler may then release the dog and proceed.

Open Tunnel: The dogs must enter the end specified by the judge and exit the other end.

Bar Jumps (2): The dogs must jump over the top bar, without displacing it, in the direction indicated by the judge.

Tire Jump (1): The dogs must jump through the tire opening in the direction indicated by the judge, without knocking the tire/frame over.

Scoring

1. Each course is worth a maximum 100 points and is timed with a course limit of 90 seconds.
2. A penalty consists of the loss of 5-10 points. There is a 25-point penalty for excessive time to complete the course.
3. Refusals or run-by's can be reattempted twice. An outright refusal to complete an obstacle will be a 10-point penalty.
4. The contact zones on the A-frame, teeter totter, and cat walk are colored by yellow at the start and end of obstacle
5. The only penalty for breaking a sit or a down on the pause table is the extra time that accumulates when the count stops, and is not resumed, until the dog is back in position.
6. Any dog that commits to a contact obstacle (A-frame, Teeter Totter, Cat Walk, or Pause Table) with all four paws must, for safety reasons, continue with the obstacle. Whether the obstacle is completed or if the dog jumps off, the dog and handler must go on to the next obstacle and may not attempt that obstacle again.

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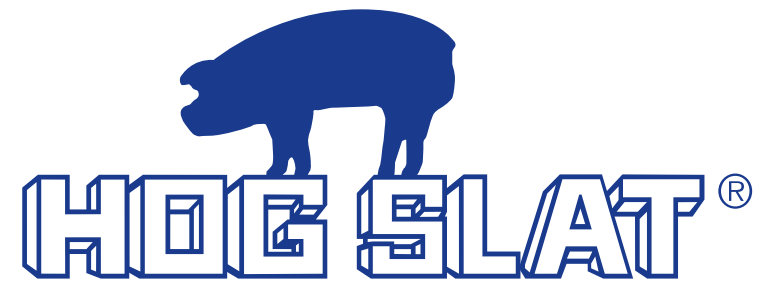
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#106 Goat Division

1. See 4-H and FFA General Rules section, Livestock and Animal Department General Rules.
2. ALL Breeding does MUST include a birthdate in their identification.
3. Horns: It is recommended and preferred that all goats be dehorned. If not, exhibitors are required to have horns disbudded or tipped blunt on all goats prior to arrival at the fair.
4. Age of the goats (Breeding does) will be determined based on the fair's first day. There will be NO class/age changing after check-in.
5. No buck/billy goats.
6. All appropriate goats must have a scrapie flock ID tag or USDA scrapie tattoo (as required by Official State Health Requirements).
 - a. If you use tattoos instead of Scrapie tags:
 - Complete numbers from both ears (or complete tail or flank numbers) must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
 - Herd tattoo prefix must be registered with USDA by calling 1-866-USDA-TAG (1-866-873-2824).
 - A statement must be included on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection
 - b. Indicating that the herd participates in the Scrapie program, and listing the official tattoo registered to the herd.
7. No fresh tattoos will be allowed at the fair.
8. Milk out time for Breeding does will be at the exhibitor's discretion. However, the judge has the right to disqualify exhibitors if animals are not handled humanely.
9. Goats must be broke to lead and shown with a halter, collar, or chain.
10. Goats can only be identified and exhibited in one section. Goats CAN NOT be shown in any other project division. There will be a championship in each section, but there WILL NOT be an overall Goat champion.

Section A - Dairy Goats

1. Individual animal identification MUST be able to be identified by ear or tail tattoo.
2. Each member may identify up to 20 Dairy Goats and exhibit up to 6 does with a maximum of 2 animals per one class.
3. Purebred and grade will show together. Tentative classes are subject to entry numbers. Final determination by show superintendents.

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Section B - Meat Goats

1. Meat goats will be divided into Market (wethers or does) and Breeding (does). All breeds and crossbreds are eligible. Does must be declared market or breeding at check-in and cannot be shown as both at the same fair.
2. All Market meat goats (males must be castrated before spring weigh-in) and must have been weighed and tagged at the county spring weigh-in site. Each member may weigh-in up to 10 market goats and will be allowed to exhibit up to 6 of those market goats at the fair.
3. Breeding meat goats must be identified by tag/tattoo number. A scrapie tag is permissible for breeding goat identification at the county fair level only. An official county tag or tattoo is required for state fair eligibility. Each member may identify up to 10 breeding meat goats and may exhibit up to 9 does with a maximum of 3 animals per any one class.
4. Individual market meat goats must weigh at least 40 pounds at fair time. Underweight individuals will exhibit in a special lightweight class and will not be eligible for purple or blue ribbons. Classes will be determined by ending weight. Rate-of-gains will be calculated.
5. Age: Meat goats must have kid teeth in normal position at fair time.
6. Hair: All market meat goats must be uniformly clipped to 3/8-inch hair or less above the knee and hock joints to include the head, excluding the tail, prior to arrival at the fair. No coloring agents or paint can be used on the goats
7. Meat goat competition will be based on meat goat characteristics, quality, and rate-of-gain.

2. Specialty goats must be identified by ear tag or tattoo or photos, including left and right and front view.

#107 Horse & Pony Division

1. See 4-H and FFA General Rules section, Livestock and Animal Department General Rules.
2. Any horse, mule, donkey, miniature horse, or pony to be shown at a 4-H show must be properly identified in 4hOnline by May 15. Jones County & State Fair eligible animals must also have photos uploaded to 4hOnline by May 15. 4-H and FFA MEMBERS ARE LIMITED TO FIVE TOTAL ANIMALS TO IDENTIFY. Refer to publication 4H 202 for more details on ownership and identification requirements.
3. Each member may exhibit up to four projects but only ONE animal/entry in each class, except in timed events and reining classes (refer to Rule 16). Leased horses must have completed lease form, 4H 106C. It is the responsibility of the owner to designate the type of the horse and/or pony. Uploaded into 4hOnline by May 15. A substitute show person cannot be used in the "riding" classes.
4. A colt or filly foaled after June 1 is eligible for show during the current year only if it is the foal of a regularly enrolled 4-H project mare and is shown in Open Weanling Halter (mare and foal both enter the ring, only foal will be judged). Male weanlings may be shown, but yearlings and other stallions are ineligible for 4-H shows.
5. It is the responsibility of the owner to designate the type of the horse and/or pony. PONIES are any equine under 14.1 hands. A HORSE is any equine 14.1 hands and over (14.1 hands equals 57 inches). Ponies that are shod will have one-half inch deducted from height. Any equine under 14.1 hands (57 inches) will be considered a pony. All entries in pony classes

may be measured on show day, and these entries must be 57" or under to qualify for the pony division. POA height cards will be accepted. EXCEPTION: If you have horse breed registration papers, you are allowed to classify the animal as a horse. Example – if a Quarter Horse is 14.0 hands and is registered with AQHA, the equine can be classified as a horse. Registration papers must be provided at check-in time. Miniature horses and donkeys will be included in this Division and not in Pets Division. Age of pony or horse is as of January 1, age of member is according to 4-H methods.

6. The member must take an active role in the care and management of the animals. A family-owned horse or pony may be managed by no more than two members of a family on a 50% basis. HOWEVER, ONLY ONE MEMBER WILL BE ALLOWED TO EXHIBIT THE SHARED ANIMAL AT THE FAIR. Leased or borrowed horses may NOT be exhibited in halter classes. If the horse is leased or borrowed, 4-H members will enter information in 4hOnline; a signed lease agreement MUST be attached to the identification form (FFA members only).
7. A vet check will be conducted upon fair arrival.
8. For questions about proper and prohibited equipment for specific classes, refer to the following pages in the Iowa State University Extension and Outreach 4-H Rules & Regulations for Equine Shows in Iowa handbook.

9. Exhibitor attire must be in accordance with State Fair 4-H regulations. Exhibitors MUST wear the 4-H or FFA armband on the upper left arm or a 4-H chevron or FFA emblem on the upper left chest. FFA members have the option to wear official FFA jackets over their shirts. Chaps, ball caps, tank tops, T-shirts, or jersey-type shirts ARE NOT to be worn. English attire is required for English classes. Committee reserves the right to wave dress code rule(s) due to weather conditions.

A. English Attire – Hunt Seat: Clothing must be clean, neat, and appropriate for hunter classes. Hunt seat type helmets must be worn. Hair must be neat and contained (as in net or braid). Riders must wear coats, boots, and breeches. Exhibitors must wear hunt coats of traditional colors such as navy, dark green, gray, black, or brown. Maroon and red are improper. Clean shirts with stock and pin or ratcatcher and choker preferred. The coat should be any tweed or melton (conservative wash jackets in season) acceptable for hunting. Breeches (or jodhpurs) are to be of traditional shades of buff, khaki, canary, light gray, or rust. Exhibitors must wear high English boots or paddock (jodhpur) boots of black or brown. Spurs of the unrowelled type, gloves, crops, or bats are optional.

B. Western Attire: Clothing must be neat and clean. A solid white or colored, button or snap front, long-sleeved, collared shirt is required. The following is prohibited: personalized logo, embroidery (excluding shirt brand logo), zippers, sheer or lace fabric, embellishments, bling of any kind, including but not limited to sequins, rhinestones, chains, etc. Shirts must be tucked in. A necktie, kerchief or bolo tie are permitted, but not required. Sleeveless shirts or blouses, turtleneck sweaters, sweater vests, etc. are not permitted. Dark blue jeans without holes must be worn. A belt is required. Western boots must be worn. (Fashion heels are prohibited.) Spurs are permissible. Spurs must be dull and the rowels free moving.

10. Protective Headgear Policy – All 4-H and FFA exhibitors must wear properly fitting protective headgear passing or surpassing current applicable ASTM/SEI (American Society for Testing and Materials/Safety Equipment Institute) standards with harness secured while riding anywhere on the competition grounds. Harness must be secured and properly fitted. NO HATS, SCARVES, ETC., ARE TO BE WORN UNDER THE HELMET. It is the responsibility of the rider, parent, or guardian to see that the headgear worn complies with appropriate safety standards for protective headgear intended for equestrian use and is properly fitted and in good condition. Any rider violating this rule at any time will immediately be prohibited from further riding until such headgear is in place. No helmet will result in disqualification. Jones County and Iowa State University Extension make no representation or warranty, expressed or implied, about any protective headgear, and caution riders that death or serious injury may result despite wearing such headgear as all equestrian sports involve inherent dangerous risk and as no helmet can protect against all unforeseeable injuries. Artificial hairpieces will be allowed in tails. No body hair may be colored. Coloring is only allowed on hooves.
11. Artificial hair pieces will be allowed in tails. No body hair may be colored. Coloring is only allowed on hooves.
12. Horse exhibitors competing at the county fair MUST HAVE attended at least one Extension-offered horse clinic with their project prior to their initial exhibition at the county fair each year. If the preferred clinic is canceled, exhibitors must still attend a different offered clinic. Members DO NOT have to qualify at the county fair to be eligible to exhibit at the State Fair. If classes have a small amount of entries, classes will be combined for showing but still judged and placed within their division.

13. Show Class Entries MUST BE COMPLETED by July 1 through the FairEntry system (at the same time as the Entry Form) to be eligible to exhibit at the county fair. If a horse that is registered for a class would like to be replaced with a different horse, an exhibitor may do so as long as the replacement horse was registered in 4-H online by the May 15 deadline.
14. If classes have a small number of entries, classes may be combined for showing but still judged and placed within their division.
15. Each horse is eligible for only one style pleasure and walk-trot class; for example, if a horse enters Ranch Pleasure, it cannot also enter Western Pleasure. An exception to this rule is the 5 and under pleasure class. These horses or ponies may compete in this class and a Ranch or Western Pleasure class of choice.
16. For timed event classes and reining class, exhibitors may enter and exhibit a maximum of two pre-identified animals per class.
17. Champion Timed Event will be determined by accumulated time for all timed classes (poles, barrels, and flags). For exhibitors with multiple entries per class, the exhibitor/animal pair with the best accumulated time will be used in champion selection; any other exhibitor/animal pair(s)' accumulated time(s) will be discarded.
18. Champion Western Exhibitor will be determined by accumulated points from their placing in Western Walk-Trot, Western Pleasure, and Horsemanship.
19. Champion Ranch Exhibitor will be determined by accumulated points from their placing in Ranch Walk-Trot, Ranch Pleasure, and Ranch Riding.
20. An exhibitor must exhibit the same horse/rider combo for either the Overall Ranch or Western award, and can compete with a different horse for the other Overall Ranch or Western award. The exhibitor can compete in classes for the other award with any horse, but those points will not go towards an overall award. Only points from the 3 classes of the chosen category with the same horse/rider combo will be calculated for the chosen award. For example, the same horse/rider combo can be shown in Western Walk-Trot, Western Pleasure, Horsemanship and Reining but the Reining score will not be used in the Overall Western Award.

Horse & Pony Division

Both horse and pony allowed in each class unless noted in class title.

1. See 4-H and FFA General Rules Section. Livestock and Animal Department General Rules.
2. Young birds will be able to be identified in family partnership prior to Pullorum testing/banding.
3. All entries will consist of single birds except for the Market and Breeding Pens.
4. Each member will be allowed to Pullorum test/banding up to 30 birds and exhibit up to 12 individual entries and 4 pen entries.
5. For all individual sections of chickens, duck, geese, turkeys, and other poultry; each exhibitor is limited to one rooster/drake/gander/tom (over 1 year of age), one cockerel, young drake, young gander/young tom (under 1 year of age), one hen (over 1 year of age), one pullet, young hen (under 1 year of age) of the specific variety of a specific breed within a section. For pen entries, exhibitors will be limited to one market broiler pen, one market roaster pen, one market duck pen, one market geese pen, one market turkey pen, one egg production pen, and one breeding pen.
6. Breeds not listed in this book will be placed in the appropriate section at the discretion of the poultry committee.
7. Market Broiler Futurity Pen/Market Roaster Futurity Pen:
 - a. All birds will be purchased at one time through the county by completing an application for purchase at the designated date.
 - b. All birds will be identified with wing bands. All birds will be identified to specific exhibitor at time of the purchase and will be checked at the time of weigh in.
 - c. Birds will be divided as either broilers or roasters at the time of weigh in. Broilers are under 6 pounds individually and roasters are over 6 pounds individually. In the event birds from the same pen falls into both classes; the average weight of all three birds will be used to determine the class they will exhibit in.
8. ALL POULTRY (includes all chickens, ducks, turkeys, geese, other poultry, and all market pens) MUST be Pullorum tested by an authorized tester. The test is good for 90 days. Broilers and Roasters ONLY will be tested at a designated time and site the day of check in.
9. Due to the health requirements of Pullorum certification, poultry will not be allowed in the barn before posted check-in times. **Birds with lice and/or mites will be disqualified, not allowed in the barn, and sent home immediately from the check-in/barn/exhibition site at the fair. If poultry from flock originating from same address is found with mites/ lice/eggs the entire flock goes home and cannot exhibited.** Mites have a 34-week life span with starvation with a 21 day life cycle and lice have a 14 day life span with starvation with a 7 day life cycle.
10. There will be a champion and reserve champion selected for each poultry category as well as a Best of Show awards.

11. The poultry will be evaluated on general health and quality of the birds.

12. Egg Show:

- a. Each exhibitor is limited to 1 entry (1 dozen eggs) in each class
- b. Eggs entered must be produced by exhibitor's own flock.
- c. All eggs shall be properly cleaned, dried and in a carton (dozen). Any entry that is dirty or has an odor shall be disqualified. The exhibitor's name must be printed on the spine of the carton.
- d. Judge and show superintendents reserve the right to move entries from 1 class to another when incorrectly classified.
- e. Eggs will be judged by weight, uniformity of color, uniformity of shape, and shell texture.

 - Derby individuals must be weighed and ear-tagged by designated 4-H officials in the spring.
 - Market individuals MUST be ear-tagged at the designated weigh-in site in the spring but will not be required to weigh in.
 - Derby Individuals CAN NOT show as both Derby Individuals and Market Individuals. However, "nominated" Derby lambs that are not exhibited as Derby Individuals may be exhibited as Market Individuals. Nominated Market Individuals CAN NOT show as Derby Individuals.
 - Special identification requirements MUST be met at the weigh-in for market lambs to be eligible for entry in the 4-H division at the Iowa State Fair and other regional shows.
- Ewe lambs may be eligible for either breeding or market classes ONLY IF all appropriate information is provided in the identification process by May 15. However, lambs shown in breeding ewe classes cannot be shown in market classes.
- Registered sheep must be identified on the identification form/4hOnline.
 - Original registration papers for Registered sheep must be presented at the Fair check-in site.
 - There must be at least three heads to have an individual breed class of Registered ewes or market lambs.
 - Otherwise, there will be an "All Other Breeds" class for breeds with less than three heads.

Specific breed trophies will not be used for breeds transferred to the AOB classes.

- Lambs in the speckled face division must have speckles on TWO of the three areas: face, ears, and legs. Color must be at least 1/3 of that area. The face will include the poll's top down to the nose (see photo). Leg wool and wool caps are not considered part of the 1/3 coloring; hair color only is allowed.
- All breeding sheep must have a scrapie flock ID tag. No exceptions.**
- Due to health conditions related to club lambs, all Market lambs MUST be slick shorn upon arriving on the fairgrounds. Suggested fleece length for purebred breeding sheep is 1/4 inch with a 3/4 inch maximum, except for wool breeds with no maximum length.
- All lambs must have four feet on the floor in the show ring at all times. Lifting/holding/supporting feet off the ground are not acceptable. Exhibitors will receive one warning for such an offense, and the second offense will disqualify the exhibitor from the entire sheep show.
- A "Supreme Champion Market Lamb" will be selected from the Derby (live) and Market Lamb classes.

6. All pigs MUST be properly ear notched BEFORE Spring weigh-in/identification. Pigs with fresh bloody wounds (from ear notching, castrating, etc.) WILL NOT be weighed in. All pigs MUST be tattooed and ear-tagged at the spring weigh-in/ identification time (which will be checked at the fair).
7. If a pig loses its ear tag, the member must contact the Extension Office immediately to have a committee member/representative put in a replacement tag.
8. All qualified pigs WILL be entered in the carcass contest. Gilts and barrows will have separate carcass competition classes.
9. A "Supreme Champion Market Pig" will be selected from the Derby (live), Home Farrowed, Purchased, Registered, and Single Source
10. A "Supreme Champion Breeding Gilt" will be selected from the breeding gilt classes. A reserve champion will be selected in case the champion cannot go on to the Best of the Best show.
11. All swine entered in the Purebred/Registered class must be identified as purebred pigs in 4hOnline.
12. Pedigrees will be required for all purebred/registered swine. The original registration paper must be presented at the fair weigh-in.

4. The pigs will be judged on quality and finish from a market standpoint.

Section C - Breeding Gilts

Class I. Purebred

Class J. Commercial

1. All gilts shown in the purebred breeding classes must meet all registry requirements for show as established by the breed association.
2. When there are fewer than 5 head in any one breed, they will show as AOB (All Other Breeds).
3. Exhibition as breeding gilts must be designated at spring swine identification event. Designation as purebred or commercial must be completed at the spring identification event.
4. Breeding gilts will show by weight.

Swine Fair Time (July)

1. Each member may exhibit up to 6 pigs (with no restrictions as to the number that is Market or Derby or Breeding Gilts). A member is not required to exhibit a Derby Individual.
2. All swine must be weighed in at the scheduled time. Pigs will not be weighed with excessive dirt on them. There is no weight restriction for Derby Individuals. All Market and Breeding individuals are recommended to weigh over 225 pounds at fair time. There is no maximum weight restriction for Market Individuals, however, exhibitors need to be aware of packer discretion for dockage on overweight individuals.
3. All Derby Individuals will compete on a live and carcass basis. All Market Individuals that weigh 240 pounds or more WILL be entered in the carcass contest.
4. Derby Individuals CAN NOT show as both Derby Individuals and Market Individuals. However, "nominated" Derby pigs that are not exhibited as Derby Individuals may be exhibited as Market Individuals. Nominated Market Individuals CAN NOT show as Derby Individuals.
5. Gilts may be shown as Derby Individuals or Market Individuals or Breeding Gilts, not both or any combination of more than one.
6. No snaring of pigs on the fairgrounds.
7. A completed Animal Care and Management Drug Disclosure statement must be presented at fair check-in.
8. No fresh ear notches will be allowed at the fair.

Pork Carcass Contest

1. The entries in the Market Swine Individual Classes that weigh 240 pounds or more WILL be entered in the carcass contest.
2. Gilts and Barrows will have separate carcass competition classes.

Herdsmanship

Good herdsmanship is an opportunity for exhibitors to show pride in their livestock projects as well as present a positive 4-H and FFA image to the public.

Herdsmanship will be based on:

- Cleanliness of Alleys and Stalls or Pens Condition of bedding
- Manure removed Alleys clean and clear
- Feed pans removed after use
- Arrangement of Exhibit
- Animals displayed properly
- Equipment and supplies stored neatly and properly
- Stall cards displayed neatly
- Proper use of club signs
- Exhibitors Courtesy to others (other exhibitors, workers, public, etc.)
- Proper supervision of animals

Specific Herdsmanship Rules:

1. All livestock must be stalled or penned in assigned areas.
2. Exhibitors must keep their stalls/pens clean at all times. Manure should be removed from barns regularly. Aisles must be swept clean. NO SHOW BOXES, fans, feed, hay, etc. will be permitted in the aisles.
3. NO BUTT FANS in the cattle barn. All fans must be covered and used safely. Unsafe fans will be removed. Due to limited stall space, the Jones County 4-H Youth Committee has the authority to restrict excessive use of fans.
4. COMMON BEDDING will be provided in the cattle barn for the market beef and breeding heifers only. When common bedding is provided, it MUST be returned to its original condition by removing manure, hay, supplemental straw, wood shavings, etc. No straw is to be used in the Sheep or Swine pens (recommended bedding would be wood shavings, wood chips or sawdust.) ALL barn stalls or pens must have all bedding, manure, hay and feed removed after the exhibit leaves. The club/chapter will be penalized up to \$100 if their exhibit area is not cleaned out.
5. Violation of Herdsmanship Rules may subject an exhibitor to forfeit premiums and to be banned from further competition. Final decisions are up to the Jones County 4-H Youth Committee.

Showmanship

This section is designed to create more interest in and a better knowledge of exhibiting animals.

Judging will be based on:

- Exhibitor - appearance
attitude
interest
knowledge of animal
care and management
- Animal - condition
cleanliness
grooming
- Presentation - control of animal (leading, posting, etc.)
response to instruction use of necessary equipment (if appropriate)

Specific Showing Rules:

1. Exhibitors must show their own project animal(s). An exhibitor, that was previously disqualified, may not participate in showmanship in that division.
2. When appropriate and unless otherwise stated, exhibitors will be separated into:
 - Junior Division = Grades 4th-6th
 - Intermediate Division = Grades 7th-8th
 - Senior Division = Grades 9th-12th (includes graduated FFA members)
 - Master Division = Exhibitors who have already won their current age division (*Junior, Intermediate and Senior*)
3. Exhibitors can only compete in their current age division unless they are eligible for the Master Division in a respective species. Exhibitors can only compete in one Showmanship Division per species.
4. One winner will be designated in each age division for: BEEF, DAIRY, GOAT, POULTRY, RABBITS, SHEEP and SWINE.
5. Exhibitors can only win the Junior, Intermediate and Senior Division once except for: DOG
6. The Master Division will be used for the BEEF, DAIRY, GOAT, POULTRY, RABBITS, SHEEP and SWINE only. There will be only one Master Division class per species with all eligible exhibitors competing together regardless of age. An exhibitor can win a Master Division more than once.
7. A Champion and Reserve Champion will be selected from each division.

Procedures:

- A. Conduct separate showmanship classes prior to or at the end of the regular show: BEEF, DAIRY, GOAT, POULTRY, RABBITS, SHEEP and SWINE.
- B. Conduct separate showmanship classes during the regular show: DOG
- C. No separate showmanship competition is conducted: BUCKET/BOTTLE CALF, HORSE and OTHER ANIMALS

Static Department

GENERAL RULES (also see GENERAL RULES on page 4)

1. **AGE GROUPS FOR ALL PROJECTS ARE JUNIOR - GRADES 4-5-6; INTERMEDIATE - GRADES 7-8; AND SENIOR - GRADES 9-10-11-12.**
2. Eligible exhibits are an outgrowth of work done as a planned part of the 4-H/FFA member's participation in 4-H/FFA projects or programs during the current 4-H year. Exhibits can be done by an individual or group and may represent all or part of the learning in the project or program. The County Extension Office has more information on exhibiting procedures.
3. Exhibitors must choose to exhibit under 4-H OR FFA for each project area: photography, home improvement, horticulture, etc. and are limited to the number of entries after each class number and name
4. Exhibits previously entered in an FFA Ag Science Fair or any other FFA event of competition

may not be entered in any 4-H exhibit class.

5. Static Exhibit entry forms are due by July 1 through the FairEntry system.
6. Exhibits might be, but are not limited to, an actual product, poster, display box, report, notebook, model, etc.
7. All Static exhibits will be conference judged, which means a 4-H/FFA member's exhibit will be evaluated by the judge in conference with the member. Conference Judging will be held in the Berndes Center on Monday of fair at designated times for each club. Members need to check in all of their projects within one hour from the start of their club's scheduled check in time, unless the Extension Office has been notified. After judging, exhibits will be arranged for display. It is suggested that only a portion of perishable food items be left for display in the CSB Youth Development Center. All exhibits must remain in place until 6 PM, Sunday of fair. Exhibits must be checked out at designated times Sunday (July 26), (check PROJECT CHECK OUT SCHEDULE). Premium money will be withheld if exhibits are not in place at check-out time.
8. The 4-H/FFA exhibitor's goal and applicable exhibit standards will form the basis of the evaluation process. Evaluation criteria will include demonstrated learning, workmanship and techniques, and general appearance and design.
9. **GOAL:** A written goal(s) is required for EACH exhibit. A member should be prepared to answer the following questions about each exhibit during conference judging:
 - a. What did you plan to learn or do? (What was your exhibit goal(s)?)
 - b. What steps did you take to learn or do this?
 - c. What were the most important things you learned?

***Check for additional requirements in exhibit classes for food and nutrition, photography, and visual art classes. If unable to be present, an audio or video file with a goal statement and answers to the above questions, along with the written goal card may be provided as supplemental information. **Videos/audio must be limited to less than 10 minutes in length. If you have a need for a laptop/tablet/DVD player, please contact the Extension Office with your request by July 1.**

10. Only 4-H members who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or the equivalent) are eligible to exhibit at the Iowa State Fair. Group exhibits from an entire club may include 4th-grade members. In some cases, a member may have more than one exhibit selected. Exhibits of exceptional quality by members having just completed 4th grade will be given an "Outstanding Junior" ribbon. Only staff and committee members helping during judging will be allowed in the area while judges are finalizing State Fair selections.
11. Non-State Fair classes are marked with an asterisk (*).
12. All exhibits must have entry tags and be carefully labeled, giving the name and address of the exhibitor, name of the local club, and class number. If the exhibit consists of several items, each must be labeled.
13. If the exhibitor chooses a display to illustrate what was learned:
 - Posters may not exceed 24" x 36" in size. (See Classes 10490 and 10530 for smaller requirements.)
 - Chart boards, graph boards, project presentations boards, model displays, etc., may not exceed 48" x 48" in size. Maximum size is determined by measuring the flat (unfolded) dimensions.
 - Display boxes may not exceed 28" x 22" in height or width and 12" in depth
 - **EXCEPTION:** See special rule #5 for Poster Communications.
14. Endangered and threatened plants and animals (including insects), or songbird feathers and nests may NOT be used in any exhibit. Game animals legally taken are acceptable, with the exception of any hogs (Sus species) - per State Law. Live specimens of noxious weeds or invasive species are NOT permitted in any exhibit. Dried specimens are acceptable to use in exhibits, however viable noxious/invasive plant seeds shall not be included. (Links to specific information below)

15. Copyrighted material or design should not be used in a 4-H/FFA exhibit that is presented as original work by the exhibitor. Exhibitors must include permission from the copyright holder/owner when using copyrighted materials. Exhibitors must give proper credit to the original source of all materials/designs used in exhibits. (See also special rules for Visual Arts and general copyright information for 4-H'ers.) Exhibits **without permission cannot** be displayed.

Exhibits that do not comply with the class description, size guidelines, copyright restrictions, safety, and approved methods will be disqualified.

16. Art elements and principles of design are the foundation of design whether putting together fabrics for clothing and quilts, selecting furnishings for a room, or creating a drawing. Design elements are line, shape, form, color, and texture. Design principles are balance, proportion, rhythm, emphasis, and unity. Information on elements and principles of design can be found at:

17. All exhibits, activities, and programs must represent appropriate safety procedures in the development of the exhibit and during the evaluation process.
18. Each 4-H or FFA member must exhibit their own project unless their absence is excused by the County 4-H Youth Committee. Contact the County Youth Coordinator prior to the fair. Exemptions may be made for injury, illness, or special circumstances.
19. EXHIBIT DRESS CODE: (See GENERAL RULES)
20. PREMIUMS: (See 4-H & FFA PREMIUMS)
21. The management will not be responsible for loss or damage to exhibits, though they will use all care to ensure their safety.
22. All questions of doubt will be referred to the County 4-H Youth Committee.

PROJECT CHECK OUT SCHEDULE

All club booths will check out at 6:00 pm. Sunday, July 26.

CLUB BOOTHS

Each 4-H club will have an assigned area. Please keep in mind these points when planning and arranging booths:

1. The primary objective of the booth is to display 4-H exhibits.
2. The secondary objective is to incorporate an educational theme or message.
3. Members may display exhibits from any Static area.
4. Exhibits may be arranged in club booths after conference judging on Monday, July 20 until 6:30 p.m. Booths must be completed by 10:00 a.m. Tuesday, July 21.
5. Booth structural materials will be provided by Extension.
6. Booths will be judged Tuesday morning on the basis of:
 - (1) Educational Value, (2) Originality, and (3) Neatness.
7. Each booth should include an activity poster showing a variety of the club's activities and a poster listing the members, leaders, and officers.
8. When arranging the booth, please turn entry tags over and write the exhibitor's name in large letters, so visitors can locate exhibits of specific members.
9. A sign, no larger than 8 1/2" x 11", may be used to indicate that a member has a State Fair Exhibit.
10. Exhibits considered for State Fair and exhibits of outstanding members just completing 4th grade will have special ribbons (do not designate with signs).
11. A rope or other firm barrier (not just crepe paper) should be put across the front of the booth.
12. It is advisable to cover delicate or light-colored fabric items with clear plastic to protect them from dust, flies, etc.
13. All community clubs that have members carrying Static projects will have a booth.

All large exhibits that will not fit in the club booth may be displayed in designated indoor/ outdoor space.

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Section A – Animals

CLASS 10110 Animal Science (2 entries)

An exhibit (other than the animal itself) that shows learning about a large or small animal including beef, dairy cattle, dairy goats, dogs, horse & pony, meat goats, pets, poultry, rabbits, sheep, and swine. Ownership of an animal is not required..

CLASS 10120 Veterinary Science (2 entries)

An exhibit that shows learning about keeping animals healthy, animal diseases, animal/human health interaction, or other learning related to Veterinary Science.

Section B – Agricultural and Natural Resources

CLASS 10210 Crop Production and Plant Science (2 entries)

An exhibit shows learning about growth, use, and value of field crops; plant growth; soils and soil fertility; or any other learning related to crop production and plant science.

CLASS 10220 Conservation, Environment, and Sustainability (2 entries)

An exhibit that shows the connections between humans and their environment including energy, energy conservation, stewardship, conservation, creating habitat, etc.

CLASS 10222 Entomology (2 entries)

– An exhibit (excluding live specimens) that shows learning or is an outgrowth of an entomology or bee project experience. Includes specimen collections and may include products (ex: honey) or equipment as part of the display.

CLASS 10224 Fish and Wildlife (2 entries)

– An exhibit that shows learning about a fish and/or wildlife project or program such as identification, habitats, harvest, taxidermy, etc. Any specimens must have been legally taken and must include information about date and location of harvest, and who the specimen was acquired from if not self-harvested. Feral pigs (including Russian/ European Boar) are NOT permitted in taxidermy exhibits.

CLASS 10226 Forestry (2 entries)

– An exhibit, including collections, that show learning from participation in a forestry project or program.

CLASS 10230 Horticulture and Plant Science (2 entries)

– An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of plants, soils, small fruit production, vegetable and flower gardens, plant nutrition, careers, etc. (Garden crops and herbs are exhibited in classes in the 4-H Horticulture Department under 4-H Livestock and horticulture)

CLASS 10235 Home Grounds Improvement (2 entries)

– An exhibit that shows learning about landscape plans, selection of landscape plants, ornamental garden features, home yard improvement, storage sheds, careers, etc.

CLASS 10240 Outdoor Adventures (2 entries)

– An exhibit that shows learning about backpacking, biking, camping, canoeing, fishing, hiking or other outdoor activities.

CLASS 10250 Safety and Education in Shooting Sports (2 entries)

– An exhibit that shows learning about safe and responsible use of firearms and archery equipment or wildlife management. (The exhibit may not include actual firearms or live ammunition. Archery equipment is allowed if tips are removed from arrows.

CLASS 10255 Farm Model Display

– An exhibit that depicts an aspect of farm life that demonstrates a practice or practices that include farm safety or farm operation. Evaluation is primarily based on a clear goal statement that outlines the purpose of the model and the research done to support the exhibit. This exhibit may be a display on a firm base **no larger than 36 inches by 36 inches**, accompanied by the required written or audio/video explanation of the exhibit. A binder presentation is an acceptable alternative to a physical display.

CLASS 10260 Other Agriculture and Natural Resources (2 entries)

– An exhibit that shows learning about agriculture or natural resources and does not fit in any of the classes listed above.

Section C – Creative Arts

CLASS 10310 Music (3 entries)

An exhibit that shows learning about musical performance, composition and arrangements, instruments, musical styles or history. If submitting a video or musical arrangement, it must be uploaded to YouTube.

PHOTOGRAPHY CLASSES 10320, 10325, 10340 & 10345 – COMBINED TOTAL ENTRY LIMIT OF 5 entries

CLASS 10320 Photography

An exhibit, either photo(s) or an educational display, that shows learning about photography from choosing a camera to modifying your photo. Still photos only, not video.

Photography Special Rules:

1. Photographs may be either black and white or color. Photographs must have been taken since your county fair of the previous year.
2. Photographs must be a minimum of 5 inches by 7 inches. Finished size (including mounting/matting) of single photographs may not exceed 11 inches by 14 inches. Square photos are allowed within the following dimensions: measured by inches: 7x7, 8x8, 9x9, 10x10, 11x11. Exception: Panoramic photos must not exceed 11 inches high by 24 inches in length.
3. All photographs must be printed on photographic paper and must be mounted and/or matted. Maximum thickness of finished project must not exceed ½ inch thick.
4. Mounted photos can be (a) flush-mounted [no board showing] on mounting board, or (b) with mount borders [window mat or flat mount directly on board]. Exhibitors may cut their own mounting boards, use ready-cut window mats or have matting done professionally.
 - **4-Hers are responsible for design decisions such as border, color and size.**
 - **Framed photographs (including floating frames) will not be judged.**
5. A series is a group of photographs [3 to 5] that are related to or tell a step-by-step story. Photographs must be mounted together and numbered in story order or sequence. Finished size of individual photographs in a series must be a minimum of 5 inches by 7 inches and should not exceed 8 inches by 8 inches.
6. Edited photos should include a copy of the photo before edits.
7. Subject matter of photographs must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting.
8. Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will **NOT** be displayed.
9. Iowa State Fair 4-H photography exhibitors must use the Photo Exhibit Label to provide required information for photo exhibits.
10. Exhibitors entered in 4-H Photography are not eligible to exhibit in the FFA Photography Show and vice-versa.

CLASS 10340 Creative Photography

A photographic image that was creatively edited or modified beyond reality in a creative, imaginative, and experimental way to make it more interesting and visually engaging. Could be a composite of multiple photographs.

Creative Photography Special Rules:

1. *Photograph/image may be mounted/matted or submitted (uploaded) as a digital image.*
2. *If mounted, photograph/image must be mounted on foam core no smaller than 4" in length or larger than 14" in length.*
3. *Photograph/Image can be digitally created or from a film negative.*
4. *Exhibit must have the most current Photo Exhibit Label on back with required information for photo exhibits. Exhibit write up should include additional information about the processes and decisions used to develop exhibit.*
5. *Subject matter must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting.*
6. *Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.*

CLASS 10345 Photography Ideas/ Educational Display

An exhibit that demonstrates learning about photography that does not fit into any previous photography class. This class may include educational displays about printing, processing, editing, marketing, branding, merchandising, etc., as it relates to photography. Display board size may not exceed 48 inches by 48 inches.

CLASS 10350 Visual Arts Original Art (2 entries)

An exhibit that showcases the skills you have developed in one or more mediums. Original art is a one-of-a-kind, non-replicable design of your creation. By using one medium or a combination, an individual creates an authentic work of art that is not recognizable as another's work. You must explain the application of the most relevant design element(s) and art principle(s) featured in this exhibit. Describe your inspirations, reasons, feelings, and/or motives for creating this work of art.

CLASS 10355 Visual Arts -Design, Process, or Technique Exploration (2 entries)

This class emphasizes process and provides the opportunity to explore a medium, practice a skill, or study and apply elements and principles of art and design. The class is for experimenting with and practicing skills in different mediums. An explanation of the application of design elements

or art principles used when making the exhibit must be included. This exhibit may be an object, portfolio, display, poster, or organized sketchbook. If a non-original design source is used, its origin (where the idea was found, any pictures, sketches, etc.) must be credited, acknowledged, or have copyright permission obtained. See Visual Arts Special Rule #5 and #6.

CLASS 10360 Visual Arts - Other Visual Art Ideas/Topics (2 entries) –

Exhibits might include the study and research about an individual artist, style, craft, business or marketing process, planning group tour, career options, etc.

Visual Arts Special Rules:

1. Items entered for exhibition at the Iowa State Fair must be ready for display (artwork framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc.) or the member must explain how a larger, heavier exhibit will be displayed. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products (such as sawtooth hangers) are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing at the state fair.
2. Exhibits made from kits or preformed molds will not be accepted. Exception: Preformed molds (greenware, whiteware) may be used to provide the appropriate surface for a process technique or application of original design.
3. If the exhibit is a finished art object, the source of inspiration of the design, design sketches, or other process for creating the object and design must be included. For additional information, see the Visual Arts and Design Elements & Art Principles Exhibit Tip Sheets at www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/exhibit-tip-sheets.
4. If the exhibit is a finished art object, information must be included explaining the application of design elements and art principles used in creation of the work.
5. Original works of art must be a creative expression of a design unique to the artist or represent a significant modification to an existing design to make a new and original statement by the artist.
6. Exhibition of derivative works created by a 4-H member is prohibited without the written permission of the original copyright holder/owner. Use of copyrighted or trademarked designs, images, logos, or materials in 4-H visual arts exhibits is prohibited unless written permission has been obtained from the copyright or trademark holder/owner. For additional information, see 4-H Exhibit Copyright Information at <https://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/visual-art>.

***Class 630 Kit (1 entry) –** Made from a Kit. May include ceramics. (Not eligible for State Fair—refer to Static general rules.)

Section D – Family and Consumer Sciences

TO ENTER CLOTHING EVENT, SEE RULES IN SECTION H.

CONTACT THE EXTENSION OFFICE FOR CLOTHING EVENT ENTRY DEADLINES

Clothing and Fashion Special Rule:

1. Exhibits in classes 10420 and 10422 must include information about the application of design elements and art principles. Exhibits in class 10424 should include information about the application of design elements and art principles if appropriate for the exhibit.

CLASS 10410 Child Development (2 entries)

An exhibit that shows learning about children. An exhibit could include careers in child development, caring for children with special needs, childcare, growth and development, or safety and health. An exhibit that includes items intended for use with children, such as babysitting kits, books, learning games, or toys, must include information about what you have learned about children while creating and using the exhibit OR what the child/children learned from their use of the item(s) in the exhibit.

CLASS 10420 Clothing and Fashion – Constructed/Sewn Garments & Accessories (2 entries)

A constructed garment or accessory (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and/or clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

CLASS 10422 Clothing and Fashion – Purchased Garments & Accessories (2 entries)

Purchased garments or accessories that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and/or clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

CLASS 10424 Clothing and Fashion – Other Ideas/Educational Exhibits (2 entries)

Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about clothing and fashion including but not limited to design illustrations, exploration of clothing styles, careers, clothing care, etc

CLASS 10430 Consumer Management (2 entries)

An exhibit that shows learning through savvy budgeting, comparison shopping, money management, and consumer rights and responsibilities.

CLASS 10440 Food & Nutrition – Prepared Product (2 entries)

An exhibit of a prepared food product that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating, and choosing healthy foods, or safety practices through the making of a prepared food product. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide" at <https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434> for additional information regarding prepared food products.

CLASS 10442 Food & Nutrition – Preserved Product (2 entries) – An exhibit of a preserved food product that shows skills or learning about food preservation through the making of a prepared or preserved food product. Processed honey may be exhibited in this class. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide" at store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434 for additional information regarding preserved food products. Display boxes are not allowed for prepared products at the Iowa State Fair.

CLASS 10445 Food & Nutrition – Educational Display (2 entries)

An educational exhibit (poster, report, display) that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating, and choosing healthy foods, meal planning & service, safety practices, or food preservation. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide" for additional information regarding prepared and preserved food products. Exhibits showing learning about table settings or menu planning must include a menu.

1. Any exhibit considered to be a food safety risk or portray a food safety risk will not be accepted, judged, or displayed.
2. All food products/exhibits should be appropriate for human consumption.
3. Food product exhibits must be prepared, baked, or cooked using only food-grade utensils and containers.
4. Products that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged, or displayed.
5. Meat jerky products are prohibited.
6. The recipe must be included for any prepared or preserved food exhibit, including the source of the recipe.
7. Preserved foods must include the Preserved Food 4-H Exhibit Label. Only food processed after August 1, 2025, is acceptable. Current USDA and/or Iowa State University guidelines for home food preservation must be used. Processed honey must include the Honey Label for 4-H Exhibits.
8. Preserved foods exhibits must include two product samples. One will be opened for evaluation and discarded; the second will be placed on display and returned to the exhibitor. All perishable food products will be discarded when removed from display.
9. Prepared foods should be placed on a firm disposable plate or flat cardboard. Place food product exhibit in a re-closable plastic bag with entry tag fastened outside the bag. Recommended number of items to include with the exhibit:
 - a. Cookies, cupcakes, bars, muffins, rolls, etc. – four (4) to six (6) items
 - b. Cakes, loafs, pies, etc. – one (1) whole product
10. The use of alcoholic beverages in the preparation or production of 4-H food exhibits is NOT permitted.

CLASS 10450 Health (2 entries)–An exhibit that shows learning through food choices, physical activity, safe activities, skills such as first aid and CPR, careers, and/or healthy lifestyle choices.

CLASS 10460 Home Improvement (2 entries) – An exhibit that shows learning in planning, improving and caring for your home living space, including extended personal living areas immediately adjacent to the home. Exhibits may include new or refinished/reclaimed/restored items. Exhibits showing learning about home design, furniture, home accessories, and fabrics must include information about how design elements and art principles were applied.

Home Improvement Special Rule:

1. Items entered for exhibition at the Iowa State Fair must be ready for display (artwork frames, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc.) or the member must explain how a larger, heavier exhibit will be displayed. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.
2. Exhibit write-up/information must include source of inspiration and/or references indicating where the idea or information was obtained, giving credit to original author(s), designer(s), artist(s).

CLASS 10470 Sewing and Needle Arts – Constructed item (2 entries)

A constructed (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning and skill in

sewing, knitting, crocheting, or other needle arts. May include the construction of household items such as pillowcases, curtains, table runners, quilts, wall hangings, etc. Exhibits in this class are not intended to be worn by humans.

CLASS 10472 Sewing and Needle Arts – Other Ideas/Educational Exhibits (2 entries)

Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about sewing and needle arts including construction techniques, use and care of fabrics and fibers, design illustrations, decorative processes, careers, etc.

Note: Exhibits in classes 10470 and 10472 should include information about application of design elements and art principles if appropriate for the exhibit.

CLASS 10480 Other Family and Consumer Science (2 entries)

An exhibit that demonstrates learning about a family and consumer science topic that does not fit any other Family and Consumer Science class listed.

Special Exhibition: Thrifty Meal Challenge

CLASS 10490 –Thrifty Meal Challenge – Create a balanced, nutritious meal for family of four (4) that includes a serving from each of the five food groups with a budget of \$11 (the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefit allowance for one meal for a family of four as of November 2025).

Thrifty Meal Challenge Special Rules:

1. Each county may advance one (1) exhibit in this class to the Iowa State Fair.
2. All entries will receive an evaluation and ribbon.
3. Exhibit may be from an individual or group effort.
4. The total expense on receipt(s) must not exceed \$11.
5. The meal must serve four (4) people, with a serving for each person from each of the recommended food groups: Protein, Dairy, Healthy Fats, Vegetables, Fruits, and Whole Grains.
 - a. Recommended serving sizes per person: 3 ounces protein, 1 cup dairy, 1 tablespoon healthy fats, ½-1 cup vegetables, ½ cup fruit, ½-1-ounce whole grain. .
 - b. If there is a dairy allergy, you may substitute it with a calcium-rich item, but you will need to indicate the allergy and identify how the item substituted provides enough calcium.
6. The exhibit will be a poster (maximum size 20 inches x 30 inches) that includes:
 - a. The menu, a list of food items, and appropriate portion sizes for each food item.
 - b. Meal type (breakfast, lunch, or dinner).
 - c. Copy of grocery receipts (up to 2).
 - d. Photos of the experience: grocery shopping, food preparation, and prepared meal.
 - e. The completed Thrifty Meal Challenge Worksheet attached to the back of the poster.
 - f. Failure to include the above documentation or adding a folder or binder will drop the exhibit one ribbon placing.

Section E – Personal Development

CLASS 10510 Citizenship and Civic Engagement (2 entries) – An exhibit that shows learning about or contributing to your community, your country or your world.

CLASS 10520 Communication (2 entries) – An exhibit that shows learning about written, oral, or visual communication skills. Includes learning from participation in Theatre Arts projects or programs such as puppets, stage design, etc. May include original creative writing, poetry, fiction, non-fiction, etc. If finished exhibit includes audio or video, it must be uploaded to YouTube.

CLASS 10530 4-H Poster Communication Exhibit (1 entry) – Special poster exhibit to visually tell a story or idea about 4-H to the general public. Exhibitors must use one of the following themes:

- 4-H is . . . (open to 4-H'er's interpretation)
- Join 4-H
- Beyond Ready in 4-H (2025 National 4-H Week theme)
- 4-H Spirit (variation of 2026 Iowa State Fair theme)
- 4-H for America's Next 250 Years (celebrating America's 250th birthday)

Poster Communication Special Rules:

1. Only one (1) poster per 4-H member may be entered. Limit of two posters per county can advance to the Iowa State Fair.
2. All posters must be designed on, or affixed to, standard poster board or foam core board: size minimum of 14 inches by 20 inches or maximum of 15 inches by 22 inches.
3. Posters may be vertical or horizontal.
4. Posters may be any medium: watercolor, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils, collage, digital images, etc. If digital images or a computer program is used to create the finished poster, the member needs to cite their sources on the Poster Exhibit Entry Form.
5. Posters cannot be 3-dimensional. Materials used to make the poster may not extend more than 1/8 inch above the poster or foam core board.
6. Each poster must have the completed Poster Exhibit Entry Form attached to the back.
7. Posters cannot use copyrighted material or exact copies of other promotional designs, such as the Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme logo.
8. 4-H members may include the 4-H clover in the poster.
9. All 4-H Communication Posters will receive Certificates of Recognition and written evaluation comments. Outstanding posters will receive Seals of Merit. Superior posters will receive Seals of Excellence.

CLASS 10540 Digital Storytelling (2 entries) – An exhibit that demonstrates the application of technology to produce a creative film/movie/video. Exhibits may include a finished movie or video, creation of a detailed storyboard, editing techniques using digital video software, production techniques, or other display to share what was learned. Copyright permission must be obtained for any non-original material included as part of a film/movie/video. Finished film/movie/video must be uploaded to YouTube.

CLASS 10550 Leadership (2 entries) – An exhibit that shows learning about leadership skills and influencing others in a positive way.

CLASS 10560 Self-Determined (2 entries) – An exhibit that shows learning as part of your 4-H adventure and does not fit any other class.

Personal Development Special Rule:

1. Exhibits entered in the Personal Development classes should include reflection by the 4-H member stating how they personally grew or benefited from the exhibit. Why was this exhibit important to them as a person?

Section F – Science, Engineering and Technology

10610 Mechanics (2 entries) – An exhibit that shows skills or learning about general mechanics or engineering solutions, or that combines skills related to the design, construction, and repair of structural and mechanical technologies

10612 Automotive (2 entries) – Repaired or restored vehicle or educational display showing learning about an automotive idea including automotive maintenance, auto operations, auto safety, or automotive systems.

10613 Automotive: Educational Display (2 entries) – An exhibit that shows learning about an automotive idea including automotive maintenance, auto operations, auto safety, or automotive systems.

10614 Electric (2 entries) – Constructed or repaired article or educational display that shows skills or learning about electric wiring, appliances, lighting, electrical energy sources, safety, etc.

10615 Small Engine (2 entries) – Repaired or restored operating engine or educational display or other type exhibit that shows skills or learning about small engines. This class includes repaired or restored lawn tractors, small motorcycles, go-karts, etc.

10616 Tractor (2 entries) – Repaired or restored tractor (or educational display showing learning related to tractors, tractor mechanics, tractor operations, or tractor safety. Please bring chocks for back tires of tractor.

10617 Tractor: Educational Display (2 entries) - An exhibit that shows learning related to tractors, tractor mechanics, tractor operations, or tractor safety

10618 Welding (2 entries) – Constructed item or educational display that shows skills or learning about welding.

10620 Woodworking (2 entries) – Any exhibit that shows learning about wood, woodworking techniques, and safe uses of woodworking tools and machines. Exhibits may include newly constructed or refinished/reclaimed/restored wood items.

10630 Science, Engineering & Technology (2 entries) – Any exhibit that shows learning about or helps explain how science and technology help us interact with the world. Topics include biological and chemical sciences, computers & networking, earth & climate, geospatial mapping (GPS/GIS), or any other application of Science, Engineering, or Technology.

10632 Aerospace (2 entries) – Educational display or other exhibits (including flyable models) showing learning about an aerospace idea or topic.

10634 Robotics (2 entries) – Educational display or other exhibits (including working robots) that shows learning about robotics and robotic systems.

Science, Engineering & Technology Special Rule:

1. Exhibitors entered in the 4-H Science, Engineering, and Technology classes are not eligible to exhibit in similar FFA Ag Mechanics classes and vice versa.
2. Exhibits must be ready for display (artwork frames, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc.) or the member must explain how a larger, heavier exhibit will be displayed. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products (like sawtooth hangers) are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.
3. Due to available space, vehicles will be displayed outdoors. If a vehicle is permitted to be displayed indoors, fuel must be drained before the exhibit can be accepted for evaluation and display. No fuel is allowed inside the building.

CLASS 11101 JUNIOR Educational Presentations

CLASS 11102 INTERMEDIATE Educational presentations

CLASS 11103 SENIOR Educational Presentations

1. Educational presentations provide an opportunity for 4-H members to demonstrate communication skills by presenting knowledge, information, or a process to an audience.
2. May be given by an individual, team, or group.
3. Presentations will be presented on July 8, 2026 before the GJCF and then awards will be given during the GJCF.
4. All presentations will receive Excellence, Merit or Participation awards. The top 6 Intermediate/Senior presentations may be selected for the State Fair.
5. **Divisions are Junior, grades 4-6; Intermediate, grades 7-8; and Senior, grades 9-12.**
6. Time limit: Junior presentations must not exceed 15 minutes. Intermediate/senior presentations must not exceed 20 minutes.
7. Clubs may enter any number of presentations at the County Level. Each club must enter at least one Clothing/Communication Event (Clothing Selection, \$20 Challenge Fashion Revue, Presentations, Working Exhibits, or Extemporaneous Speaking) for any of its members to be eligible to compete in non-fair club challenges during the following 4-H year.
8. See **GENERAL RULES for Dress Code rules.**
9. Premiums are as follows:

Excellence Ribbon Group	6 Units
Merit Ribbon Group	5 Units
Participation Ribbon Group	4 Units
10. 4-Hers doing working exhibits that involve food must be concerned for the safety of the food they are using. 4-Hers should always use sanitary and safe procedures and methods. This is tremendously important if samples are available to the viewing public. Appropriate storage of the food items and the sanitary handling of the food must be demonstrated by the 4-Hers. Plastic gloves and hairnets are just a couple of items that should be considered and used as appropriate. All methods used should be safe for involvement by audiences of all ages.

CLASS 11201 INTERMEDIATE Working exhibit

CLASS 11202 SENIOR Working exhibit

1. Working exhibits provide an opportunity for 4-H members to communicate, interact with, and teach an audience in an informal and experiential way.
2. Time limit – all participants/teams will be scheduled for a 30-minute period, with a 10-minute set up before and a 5-minute clean up following the working exhibit.

CLASS 11303 SHARE-THE-FUN

Provide an opportunity for 4-H members to share their skills and talents before an audience purely for the sake of enjoyment.

1. Eligibility: 4-H members who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2026. Exception: If the Share-The-Fun act involves a whole club, the following criteria must be applied to determine if the club can be entered in the Share-The-Fun Program at the Iowa State Fair:

- At least 80 percent of the performing group must have completed 5th through 12th grade in 2026.
 - Clover Kids are not eligible to participate in Share-the-fun.
2. Share-The-Fun performances must not exceed six (6) minutes in length.
 3. Skits, songs, stunts, short one-act plays, dance, and other entertainment are acceptable. All performances must be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
 4. All acts must turn in a completed 4-H Share-The-Fun Report form at event check-in to confirm stage setup, cue music, etc.
 5. General judge's comments for the entire show will occur at the Iowa State Fair. No individual conference with the judge will occur.

CLASS 11401 INTERMEDIATE Extemporaneous Speaking

CLASS 11402 SENIOR Extemporaneous Speaking

1. Educational presentations provide an opportunity for 4-H members to demonstrate communication skills by presenting knowledge, information, or a process to an audience.
2. May be given by an individual, team, or group.
3. Presentations will be presented on July 8, 2026, before the GJCF and then awards will be given during the GJCF.
4. All presentations will receive Excellence, Merit or Participation awards. The top 6 Intermediate/Senior presentations may be selected for the State Fair.
5. Divisions are Junior, grades 4-6; Intermediate, grades 7-8; and Senior, grades 9-12.
6. Time limit: Junior presentations must not exceed 15 minutes. Intermediate/senior presentations must not exceed 20 minutes.
7. Clubs may enter any number of presentations at the County Level. Each club must enter at least one Clothing/Communication Event (Clothing Selection, \$20 Challenge Fashion Revue, Presentations, Working Exhibits, or Extemporaneous Speaking) for any of its members to be eligible to compete in non-fair club challenges during the following 4-H year.
8. See **page GENERAL RULES for Dress Code rules.**
9. Premiums are as follows:

Excellence Ribbon Group	6 Units
Merit Ribbon Group	5 Units
Participation Ribbon Group	4 Units
10. 4-Hers doing working exhibits that involve food must be concerned for the safety of the food they are using. 4-Hers should always use sanitary and safe procedures and methods. This is tremendously important if samples are available to the viewing public. Appropriate storage of the food items and the sanitary handling of the food must be demonstrated by the 4-Hers. Plastic gloves and hairnets are just a couple of items that should be considered and used as appropriate. All methods used should be safe for involvement by audiences of all ages.

Section H – Awardrobe Clothing Event

- Each county may send the following number of participants in each class to represent their county, selected from each of the county's events:
 - Fashion Revue Class: Four participants total with no more than two (2) participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
 - \$20 Challenge Class: Four participants total with no more than two (2) participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
 - Clothing Selection Class: Four participants total with no more than two (2) participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
 - Innovative Design Class: Four participants total with no more than two (2) participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
- The categories in each class are simply for entry limit purposes. All entries in each class will be judged together.
- Participants must be in the senior 4-H designated level (completed grades 9 – 12 the same year as the event).
- Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the State 4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event may not be entered as another 4-H Iowa State Fair exhibit.
- Participants must bring the garment or outfit they purchased or created, and accessories, to the State 4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event.
- Participants should submit only the materials requested for each class (report form and photo – for ALL classes - plus a receipt for \$20 challenge). If additional materials are sent with the entry or brought to the conference judging, they will not be considered.
- Participant report forms must be uploaded by county staff no later than July 31. Participants should abide by county deadlines for submitting paperwork for entry. Requests for class or group time changes will be honored as availability allows through July 31. Requests made after July 31 cannot be accommodated due to our printing deadlines.
- A \$30 registration fee is required for each participant entry. Counties will be billed following the Iowa State Fair.
- All participants must participate in all Awardrobe Clothing Event activities at the times scheduled for their county unless the 4-H member is involved in another Iowa State Fair 4-H activity at the same time with a non-flexible schedule. Pre-approval is required prior to July 31.

Special Criteria Related to Event Participation

Fashion Revue

- The purpose of this class is to encourage the construction of a personal garment or outfit.
- Consideration is given to fit, color, style, suitability, quality of construction, stage presentation, and required care.
- Youth participants will model a garment or outfit they constructed, hand-knitted, machine-knitted, or crocheted during the current 4-H year.
- A garment or outfit consists of one to three pieces such as, but not limited to, party clothes, tailored suits, vest, slacks, shirt, skirt, active sportswear, and/or coats.
- Blouses, shirts, and sweaters are usually considered garments. If they are used to complete an outfit, they may be constructed or selected.
- All other accessories and undergarments may be constructed or selected

Clothing Selection

- The purpose of this class is to select and/or purchase an outfit that represents the 4-H member's goal or intended use for the selected outfit.
- Judging is based on fit, color, style, suitability, quality and construction features, stage presentation, required care, and cost comparison.
- There is no consideration in the judging on the amount spent, only in the process of record keeping and reflection on the cost of the individual items as a part of the process.

- Outfits may be purchased at a department store, boutique, online store, sidewalk sales, retail shops or mall stores. Outfits may also be purchased at garage sales or other secondhand venues at any price point. Outfits may be gifts, hand-me-downs, relative or friend's modern or vintage clothing, or existing personal clothing, as long as the 4-H member selected the item as part of this specific outfit for the stated purpose.
- Home-sewn clothing that was not sewn specifically for the participant are acceptable, such as purchases from a used clothing store.

The \$20 Challenge

- This class is designed to expand the 4-H member's shopping experience to shopping venues emphasizing recycling, reducing, and reusing. Outfits must be purchased at a garage sale, consignment store, thrift store, secondhand store, or similar place. This class is not for new clothing, regardless of price.
- Online venues are allowed, must be second-hand in nature. Shipping and handling are not included in the total calculations.
- Traditional shopping venues may not be used, regardless of a low regular or sale price. Hand-me-downs or clothing as gifts do not qualify for this class.
- Twenty dollars is the purchase price limit including tax. However, some secondhand stores and venues do not typically charge sales tax.
- Receipt(s) for every item included as a part of the calculated total must be submitted with the entry. A garage sale receipt can be a piece of paper with the name of the location such as "Jane Doe garage sale", date, amount paid, and signature of person selling at the garage sale. If the outfit was free at a garage sale, "free" can be listed on the report form and on the receipt. Failure to provide receipts will be reflected in the evaluation.
- An outfit consists of major clothing pieces such as a shirt, sweater, jacket, and pants and/or a dress. Shoes, undergarments, and accessories are not included in the \$20 purchase price limit.
- Alterations are permitted to achieve a desired look or fit.
- There are no additional considerations for an outfit that totals less than \$20.
- The outfit pieces should be purchased to meet the 4-H member's goal or intended use for the purchased outfit, and the 4-H member should have had an experience in choosing shopping alternatives, evaluating fit, quality and construction features, price, and cost comparison.

Innovative Design

- The purpose of this class is to encourage creativity and out-of-the-box thinking when creating an outfit.
- These designs can be theatrical costumes, cosplay, wearable technology, sustainable/upcycled fashion, accessible fashion, and/or outfits that use unconventional materials.
- The outfit must be showcased as a worn garment modeled by the exhibitor or by the individual that it was designed for.
- Exhibitors may make their garment entirely, or permanently alter the silhouette of pre-existing materials through some method of permanent alteration or addition.
- Consideration is given to originality and innovation.

GENERAL GUIDELINES

1. Only 4-H and FFA members enrolled in the Horticulture project area may exhibit (No Clover Kids).
 2. Vegetables, Herbs, Flowers, and Ornamentals exhibited MUST be from the member's garden/project.
 3. Refer to 4-H & General rules for dress code.
 4. Entries must be enrolled in FairEntry by July 1st.
 5. Exhibitors are permitted up to **TWO** entries per class unless otherwise specified for particular Divisions, Sections or Classes. Each entry must contain different varieties.
 6. EACH EXHIBIT will have an **attached** entry tag with name, address, club, class number, PLUS kind and variety of specimens (vegetables, herbs, ornamentals, or flowers). If exhibiting an unnamed variety, use the term "standard". Omitting variety name may cause lowering of placing.
 7. Exhibitors who complete initial Horticulture entries by July 1 and completed the appropriate Evaluation Reports may add additional 4-H entries when they check-in at the fair during the arrival times listed above.
 8. Check-in starts at 8:00 AM and must be finished by 10:00 AM on Tuesday, July 21 and check out is Sunday, July 26 between 4:00 and 5:00 PM.
 9. When applicable, specimens should be prepared for exhibit according to the respective publication available online or at the Extension office:
4H-462 - "Harvesting and Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit"
4H-464 - "Preparing Cut Flowers and Houseplants for Exhibit"
4H 5551 - "Harvesting and Preparing Herbs for Exhibit"
4H 5552 - Preparing Floral Arrangements for Exhibit"
- However, the number of specimens required per exhibit MUST match the class listing below. Incorrect numbers of specimens may cause lowering of placing.**
10. All entries (including Jumbos) must be in exhibit condition to qualify for exhibition and placing.
 11. Exhibits will be evaluated using the non-conference judging process.
 12. Horticulture Evaluation Reports MUST be completed and submitted with ALL entries in this Department and WILL BE evaluated/judged. Exhibitors are required to submit only one Report per Division (as specified on the forms) regardless of how many individual entries are made in that Division. There is an exception to this rule in Division 405. Goal sheets ARE NOT required in this Department. Only written materials specified within Division guidelines/rules are to be attached to the exhibit. No covers or additional materials are to be attached to the Evaluation Reports.
 13. A Champion (first place) and Reserve Champion (second place) will be identified in each produce class provided they qualify with purple or blue ribbon status. A Grand Champion will be selected from the respective class champions as follows and receive a rosette ribbon:
 - a. Division 401/402/406 Section A (single plates of vegetables)
 - b. Division 404 Herbs (single bottles of herbs)
 - c. Division 407 Flowers (single bottle/jar of cut flowers)
 14. The premiere exhibitor in Ornamental, Herbs, Flowers, and Vegetables will be determined based on points and those exhibitors will be recognized during fair.
 15. The premier club(s) will be determined based on accumulated point scores of their respective exhibitors and will be recognized during the fair.

DIVISION 401/402/406 GARDEN CROPS/VEGETABLES

1. Observe General Guidelines above. Complete ONE Evaluation Report 401 form that will cover all entries in Division 401/402/406 and Division 403.
2. Each plate should display only one kind of vegetable.
3. Plates will be provided. (No plate coverings or plastic bags will be allowed.)

- b. This platter must be exhibited by a minimum of two members of the same club/chapter.
- c. Club/chapter may enter more than one platter, but an individual exhibitor may **only participate in**

one club vegetable platter exhibit.

- d. A platter must include five different kinds of vegetables including 2 carrots, 2 onions, 2 peppers, and 2 other kinds of vegetables from the following list: 2 beets, 2 cucumbers, 2 potatoes, 2 summer squash.
 e. A special Club Vegetable Platter entry card will be provided and **MUST** accompany the exhibit with the requested information.

Class 40305–Color Platter

- a. Special platters will be provided. The amount of produce exhibited **MUST** fit on the platter.
 b. Exhibit must include three different vegetables (from previous classes 40102 to 40258) that are the same color (i.e. green, red, white, etc.) of the exhibitor's choice. For a total of three specimens.
 c. Exhibitor may enter up to two color platters, but each must represent a different color group.
 d. A special Color Platter entry card will be provided and **MUST** accompany the exhibit with the requested information.

DIVISION 404 HERBS

2. JUDGES ARE REQUESTED TO FAMILIARIZE THEMSELVES WITH ALL THE RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THIS FAIR, AND TO MARK THOSE RULES BEARING ON THE CLASSES TO BE JUDGED BY THEM.
3. INsofar AS PRACTICABLE, THE JUDGE WILL BE REQUIRED TO STATE BRIEFLY THE REASONS FOR PLACING IN THE VARIOUS CLASSES. BREEDERS AND VISITORS MAY QUESTION THE JUDGE IN A REASONABLE MANNER DURING THE EXPLANATION OF REASONS IN REGARD TO POINTS NOT WELL UNDERSTOOD.
4. ANY EXHIBITOR OR OTHER PERSON WHO INTERFERES WITH THE WORK OF THE JUDGES OR SHOWS ANY DISRESPECT FOR THEM SHALL OFFER A PROPER APOLOGY AND MAY, AT THE DISCRETION OF THE DIVISION SUPERINTENDENT, BE BARRED FROM FURTHER COMPETITION AND WITHHOLD PREMIUMS THAT MAY HAVE BEEN AWARDED.
5. THE DECISION OF THE JUDGES SHALL BE FINAL IN ALL CASES, EXCEPT WHERE MISTAKE, FRAUD, MISREPRESENTATION OF COLLUSION, NOT DISCOVERED AT THE TIME OF AWARD, IS PROVEN. IN SUCH CASES, THE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT OR SUCH REFEREE AS HE MAY APPOINT MAY MAKE DECISION; OR WITH HIS APPROVAL, THE CASE MAY BE APPEALED TO THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, FROM WHOSE DECISION THERE MAY BE NO APPEAL.
6. SHOULD ANY ANIMAL AWARDED A CASH PRIZE BE DISQUALIFIED, THE ANIMALS GAINING THE LOWER PRIZES SHALL BE GRADUATED INTO THE HIGHER POSITIONS NEXT IN ORDER ABOVE THEM-IF IN THE OPINION OF THE JUDGES THESE ANIMALS ARE WORTHY OF SUCH PRIZES.
7. JUDGES MUST NOT AWARD A PRIZE TO AN UNWORTHY EXHIBIT EVEN THOUGH THERE BE NO COMPETITION. 7. THE FAIR ASSOCIATION RESERVES TO ITS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE THE FINAL AND ABSOLUTE RIGHT TO INTERPRET THESE RULES AND REGULATIONS, AND ARBITRARILY SETTLE THESE AND DETERMINE ALL MATTERS, QUESTIONS OR DIFFERENCES IN REGARD THERETO.
8. THE FAIR ASSOCIATION RESERVES THE RIGHT TO AMEND OR ADD TO THESE RULES AS THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE IN ITS JUDGMENT MAY DETERMINE.

 - D. VEHICLE WILL NOT BE OPERATED UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF ALCOHOL.
 - E. VEHICLE WILL NOT BE OPERATED IN A CARELESS, RECKLESS, OR NEGLIGENT MANNER SO AS TO:
 - I. ENDANGER ANY PERSON; OR,
 - II. CAUSE INJURY OR DAMAGE TO PERSON OR PROPERTY.
 - F. VEHICLE WILL NOT BE OPERATED IN THE FOOD COURT AFTER 5:00 P.M. UNTIL ONE HOUR AFTER THE CONCLUSION OF THE GRANDSTAND SHOW.
4. LIABILITY INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS:
 - A. AT A MINIMUM A POLICY WITH BODILY INJURY AT \$500,000 PER PERSON, \$500,000 PER INCIDENT AND PROPERTY DAMAGE OF \$100,000 OR COMBINED SINGLE LIMITS (BODILY INJURY AND PROPERTY DAMAGE) OF \$500,000 OR EQUIVALENT. PROOF OF COVERAGE WILL BE REQUIRED TO OBTAIN A VEHICLE REGISTRATION TO OPERATE ON THE FAIRGROUNDS.

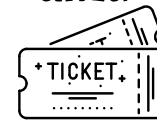

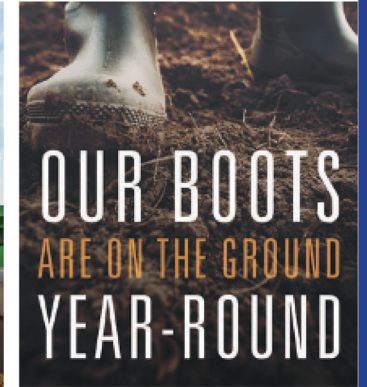
